World Marriage Day - Sunday, February 8



World Marriage Day honors husband and wife as the foundation of the family, the basic unit of society. It salutes the beauty of their faithfulness, sacrifice and joy in daily married life.

The idea of celebrating marriage began in Baton Rouge, La., in 1981, when couples encouraged the Mayor, the Governor and the Bishop to proclaim St. Valentine Day as "We Believe in Marriage Day." The event was so successful, the idea was presented to and was adopted by Worldwide Marriage Encounter's National Leadership.

By 1982, 43 Governors officially proclaimed the day and celebrations spread to U.S. military bases in several foreign countries. In 1983, the name was changed to "World Marriage Day," designated to be celebrated each year on the second Sunday in February. In 1993, Saint John Paul II, imparted his Apostolic Blessing on World Marriage Day.

Listed below are some ideas you may wish to incorporate into your parish activities. More ideas are available on the website.

- During announcement time, recognize married couples present at Mass by having all married couples stand. Start seating them in increments of five years, until the couple married longest is left standing. You may consider presenting that couple with a certificate, flowers, or a small gift. Be prepared for more than one!
- Hold a reception for all parish members after services. Pictures of parish members' wedding ceremonies can decorate the room. Serve wedding cake and punch. Have the couple that has been married the longest cut the cake.
- Share different marriage customs with the parish by having couples from different ethnic backgrounds explain customs unique to their heritage.

Lenten Resolutions for Married Couples Inspired by Pope Francis

Are you wondering how to grow in holiness this Lent, together with your spouse? Try following some advice from the Pope! In homilies and addresses, Pope Francis has spoken quite directly about how husband and wife should treat each other, about prayer within the family, and other ways the family lives its identity as a "domestic Church." So this Lent, why not commit, with your spouse, to try one of the following Lenten resolutions, based on words from the Holy Father?

- 1) Be courteous to your spouse. Use polite requests: "May I? Can I?" For example, "Would you like for us to do this?" and "Do you want to go out tonight?"
 - "To ask permission means to know how to enter with courtesy into the lives of others. ... True love does not impose itself harshly and aggressively." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014.)
- 2) Say "thank you" to your spouse. "It seems so easy to say these words, but we know that it is not. But it is important! ... It is important to keep alive the awareness that the other person is a gift from God and for the gifts of God we say thank you!" (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)
- 3) Ask forgiveness from your spouse. Say, "I'm sorry." "Let us learn to acknowledge our mistakes and to ask forforgiveness. 'Forgive me if today I raised my voice;' 'I'm sorry if I passed without greeting you;' 'excuse me if I was late." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)
 - "Never let the sun go down without making peace! Never, never, never!" (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)
 - "It is important to have the courage to ask forgiveness when we are at fault in the family." (Address to Participants in the Pilgrimage of Families, Rome, Oct. 26, 2013)



- 4) Pray together with your spouse and family. "Praying the Our Father together, around the table, is not something extraordinary: it's easy. And praying the Rosary together, as a family, is very beautiful and a source of great strength! And also praying for one another! The husband for his wife, the wife for her husband, both together for their children, the children for their grandparents... praying for each other. This is what it means to pray in the family and it is what makes the family strong: prayer." (Homily for Family Day, Rome, Oct. 27, 2013)
 - Pray to the Lord to "multiply your love and give it to you fresh and good each day." Pray together, "Lord, give us this day our daily love." (Address to Engaged Couples, Rome, Feb. 14, 2014)
- 5) Visit the elderly, especially your grandparents. "Grandparents are like the wisdom of the family, they are the wisdom of a people.... Listen to your grandparents." (Address to Participants in the Pilgrimage of Families, Rome, Oct. 26, 2013)
 - "How important grandparents are for family life, for passing on the human and religious heritage which is so essential for each and every society!" (Angelus at World Youth Day, Rio de Janeiro, July 26, 2013)
- 6) Share the faith with others. "Christian families are missionary families.... They are missionary also in everyday life, in their doing everyday things, as they bring to everything the salt and the leaven of faith!" (Homily for Family Day, Rome, Oct. 27, 2013) from USCCB's foryour marriage.org wirh permission to reprint.

Annual March for Life— Washington, DC Thursday, January 22, 2015



The March for Life is an annual pro-life rally protesting abortion. It is held in Washington D.C. on the anniversary of the January 22, 1973 U.S. Supreme Court infamous decision in the Roe v. Wade case which legalized abortion for any reason throughout all nine months of pregnancy.

Approximately 500 students, chaperones, and adults will be attending from the Archdiocese of Louisville. Last year, an estimated 500,000 from across the country attended the March for Life, despite frigid temperatures and over a foot of snow. This is a remarkable testament to the determination and perseverance of the life advocates considering that many bus trips and flights were cancelled due to a major east coast snow storm.

Preceding the March for Life, there are several Masses; three of which are available to our pilgrims--an evening Vigil Mass at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, and the morning of the March for Life, a Mass at the Basilica, followed by the Youth Rally & Mass for Life at the Verizon Center. Archbishop Kurtz will celebrate the morning Mass and concelebrate the Youth Mass.

Locally, the March for Life (youth groups and parishioners) will be gathering at the Cathedral's Undercroft at 4:30 pm on Thursday, January 22. The prayer & walk begins at 5:00 pm and finishes between 6:30 and 7:00 pm. For more information, please contact Ed Harpring at 502-471-2154. Let us hold all participants in prayer.

Lenten Campaign 2015 February 18 to March 29

40 Days for Life is a peaceful interdenominational pro-life campaign with a vision to access God's power through prayer, fasting, and peaceful vigil at over 250 abortion facilities throughout the world to end abortion.

During the fall campaign in Louisville, alone, over 700 people signed up to pray and 20 mothers changed their minds about abortion and chose life for their unborn children! Nationally, there were 546 babies saved from abortion — that we know of! And keep in mind that these aren't just numbers. That's 546 individual human beings ... and their moms ... and their dads ... and grandparents, brothers, sisters, aunts, uncles, cousins. Each time a mother says "yes" to life, the impact is profound. Archbishop Kurtz, many of our pastors, and hundreds of parishioners have witnessed to the dignity of all human life through prayer, fasting and peaceful public witness.

of the Blessed Sacrament, a rosary prayer procession to the local abortion facility, and Benediction upon return to the Cathedral. Those unable to process are invited to remain in Eucharistic Adoration at the Cathedral.
