

- Engagement of Young Adults in the Next Generation of Pastoral Leaders: To understand the needs of young adults as they move into pastoral leadership.






Emerging Models Research Components


- Quantitative Data via CARA
 - Phase 1: 846 randomly selected parishes single responder
 - Phase 2: Parish leaders survey from 60 parishes
 - Phase 3: In-pew survey from 60 parishes
 - Additional research: survey of 1000 parish leaders from the other 786 parishes along with survey of PBM/PFC in 100 parishes.
 - Reports from all three research phases, including specialized reports on each initiative.
- Learning Consortiums
- Research symposia and summary reports based upon both the quantitative and qualitative data
- Concluding symposia and final integrating report
























Ages of Lay Ministers






















2010 Hispanic Population in Catholic Dioceses






- 1991 176,000 Catholics and 65 parishes
- 2001 320,000 Catholics, 77 parishes and 131 active diocesan priests
- 2011 900,000 Catholics, 87 parishes and 141 active diocesan priests
- Number of Catholics in last decade increased by 181%, parishes increased by 13% and diocesan priests increased by 8%.
- Number of Catholics per parish grew from 4,146 in 2001 to 10, 345 in 2011.
- Ten parishes added to accommodate 580,000 new Catholics










 - 30% have 2 or more worship sites








EM – CARA – Changing Face of US Parishes - 2011

Leadership for a Multicultural Church

The Process

- Advisory Committee frames the issues
- Focus groups convened by symposium attendees
- Action research symposium
- Advisory Committee assesses symposium feedback
- Deliverables: CARA data/report; Narrative report

Leadership for a Multicultural Church

- Resources and staffing for serving multicultural communities is on the decrease nationally
- The path to leadership is seen more as a recognition of gifts and invitation rather than through academic qualifications.
- Some of the data from the CARA parish leaders and in-pew surveys do not resonate with the committee's experience.
