
World Meeting of Families Congress - Philadelphia Sept. 22-25, 2015



During the third week in September this year . . . something amazing is going to take place.

This year, in Philadelphia, just prior to Pope Francis' arrival in the United States, people from all over the world will gather to discuss, explore and learn . . . as well as celebrate and proclaim . . . the Church's teachings concerning marriage, the family, and God's special plan for humanity as wonderfully expressed in them both.

While not everyone is able to go to Philadelphia, the foundational catechetical document that is being used for the event is available for everyone right now: "Love Is Our Mission: The Family Fully Alive" which is available in English & Spanish through Our Sunday Visitor in paperback format: www.osv.com.



It is also available through Amazon in both paperback and Kindle eBook formats.

This 128 page document is intended to serve as a means of helping "better center ourselves and our discussions upon the family, the

'domestic church,' it's centrality in God's divine plan for us, and how it is to help us all become who God created us to be."

This document is intended to facilitate an easy exploration of Catholic teaching on marriage, family, sexuality, children, human dignity, and the sanctity of life. "It's a guided tour through scripture and 2000 years of Church teaching where the reader is awakened to the relationship God wants to have with us, the family, and ultimately the world."

Written in easy-to-understand language, this document lays out the complexities of God's plan in a comprehensive and truly beautiful manner, so as to promote the Church's teaching in a positive, joy-filled way, always remembering that the Gospel of Christ is indeed, first and foremost, 'good news.'

Prayer: The Best Preparation for the Synod - October 4 - 25, 2015

Fresh on the heels of his visit to the United States in September, and marking its 50th anniversary, Pope Francis will soon lead the next Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops, this time concentrating on "topics related to the family and evangelization."

The Synod will take place in Rome in October and Archbishop Kurtz has been named as one of the delegates from the United States. The theme for this synod is to be "the vocation and mission of the family in the Church and in the contemporary world." With this in mind, the bishops shall gather to discuss the many issues related to the family that are facing the Church today, with the mind to "formulate appropriate pastoral guidelines" to address them.

With such a great task on the horizon, and with the commensurate need for wisdom and divine guidance so critical, one of the most effective ways we all have of assisting in the necessary work of the Synod is with the simple power of our prayers... as Pope Francis himself has requested of all of us.



In a letter to all families in 2013, Pope Francis invited everyone to pray for the Synod of Bishops, as well as for the 2015 World Meeting of Families in Philadelphia . . . saying: "May we all, then, pray together so that through these events the Church will undertake a true journey of discernment and adopt the necessary pastoral means to help families face their present challenges with the light and strength that comes from the gospel."

The New School Year

As kids return back to school much will be said about homework, sports and of course the new teacher. Many times its the parent/teacher relationship that is overlooked. In today's world of modern technology it's easy to take for granted the speed and ease of email and texting. Lost in both are emotions that aren't conveyed in a text or email. For some, they may not have access to round the clock communication tools to talk with a teacher.

As the year begins, here are some helpful tips for parents when working with their child's teacher. Develop a relationship with the teacher before you need to communicate with them. This will help ensure everyone has a clear understanding of each other from the start. As part of this process it might also be a good idea to ensure the teacher has a parent's cell phone number and email with the assurance that the teacher can contact them whenever appropriate. Don't always take the student's word for what happened or why. Sometimes the child's version of what happened doesn't tell the whole story and always discuss your concerns with your child's teacher before going to the administration. Often, by talking to the teacher first, a parent will have a different understanding of what happened and together can remedy the situation with the teacher.

Parents should get involved in activities where they interact with the teachers, such as class parties, field trips, etc. It's a great way to get to know them and informal communication is often the best communication. Stay up with your children by checking grades and homework routinely. The more importance a parent puts on work, the more importance a student will put on their work. Many times parents can check a teacher's electronic bulletin board for homework, grades and email addresses of the teacher. If a parent doesn't have the electronic means at home to check in, a local library computer is always a good alternative. In the event a relationship cannot be established between the parent and teacher, finding a point of contact in the school the parent feels comfortable with (such as the school counselor) is key.

Most importantly parents should not wait to hear from their child's teacher to learn how they are doing. If you haven't received an update, reach out to that teacher. Teachers can tell which students' parents are involved. Research indicates there are fewer discipline problems and higher aspirations among students with involved parents.

Current statistics state that one in three women in the U.S. will have an abortion by age 45. With that in mind, we can safely assume that there are members of our parishes who hold this secret, and who are in need of healing.

Those who have experienced abortion often develop several coping mechanisms. Consequently, it often takes years before a woman can begin to deal with her abortion. As stated in Project Rachel, they can rationalize

their decision by telling themselves the baby is better off. Often, they can repress their feelings by saying that although it was a difficult decision and it hurt at the time, they did just fine and given the same circumstances, they would do it again. This repression can be great enough to even block the memory of later abortions. Occasionally, they will attempt to compensate for their abortion by being overly involved in church activities, working in the prolife movement, becoming a "super mom" or other high achievement activities. Some who are vocal in the pro-choice movement are actually reacting to their own feeling of pain regarding their abortion. It is as if by frequently expressing contrary feelings and thoughts, one can begin to believe it.




There are several possibilities for those who have had an abortion to experience healing, forgiveness, and hope. The archdiocese offers Project Rachel, a confidential, one-to-one ministry, whereby the individual meets with someone who will walk with them through some steps toward healing. If desired, Project Rachael includes the Sacrament of Reconciliation for the Catholic who wishes to receive it.

The archdiocese can also refer to neighboring dioceses in Kentucky for a weekend retreat experience, Rachel's Vineyard. Little Way Pregnancy Resource Center has recently begun offering a scripture study, "Forgiven and Set Free" which is a ten week, small group process for women. Although the program is not specifically Catholic, the group will be facilitated by Catholic women who have been trained and volunteer at the Center. Together, these ministries become part of a "menu" of healing ministries available to those who have experienced abortion.
