ART TURNER SPOKE AT OUR FEBRUARY 6 MEETING

Our speaker for this meeting was Mr. Art Turner, Executive Director of the Archdiocesan Office of Formation. His topic was "What is Faith Formation?"

Art was born in San Angelo, Texas in April of 1965. For the first 10 years of his life, he was



an "Air Force brat" moving from place to place, living in cities like San Antonio, Texas, and Anchorage, Alaska. His father retired from the Air Force in 1975 and the family moved to his hometown of Columbia, Kentucky. There the family attended Good Shepherd parish, the only Catholic community in Adair County.

Art graduated from Adair County High School in 1983, St. Meinrad in 1987, and he has a graduate degree

in theology from the Catholic University of America. Art was a seminarian for the Archdiocese of Louisville from 1983 to 1989.

He and his wife Tammy have been married 27 years and are now members of Mary Queen of Peace parish (formerly St. Helen). They have three grown children in their 20's.

Art became an employee of the Archdiocese in 1990, as a theology teacher for Trinity High School. He was the Director of Lifelong Formation and Education at St. Pius X Parish from 1997 to

2005. He was Pastoral Associate at St. Stephen Martyr Parish from 2005 to 2013. Archbishop Kurtz asked Art to take the Director of Faith Formation position in 2013.

Art started out defining "formation" – speaking of the intellectual (Catechism) side as well as the spiritual side. He spoke of various aspects of formation – seeking holiness, treating this education as a life-long process, and putting an emphasis on a "personal relationship with Jesus Christ" (even though we used to associate that phrase more with Protestant, than Catholic, terminology).

Art also spoke of formation having an emphasis on Scriptures, teaching, participation, and witnessing.

He spoke of some of the questions we should be able to answer. For example, how do we define

adoration; and can we explain it to non-Catholics? Formation can also prepare us to evangelize others, as Pope St. John Paul II frequently encouraged – being disciples and missionaries to the world. Art remembers Protestant friends inviting him to their church; but Catholics are often less comfortable inviting non-Catholics to our church services. His office exists to promote and support our parishes in these efforts at formation.

We used to think that if we opened the doors, outsiders would come; and we thought if Catholics left the Church, they'd later come around to prioritizing religion and then come back. However, it's not that simple. The Catholic message is only one voice among many religious messages the world hears, which often isn't interested in religious messages anyway.

We need to be comfortable sharing our faith. But first of all, we should ask ourselves — do we participate, or do we back away from participation in parish life, above and beyond attending Mass?

Art also spoke of the various programs that the Department of Formation promotes (e.g., the Discipleship Program, training of Catechists, helping with retreats and workshops). He said that last year, two women completing one of these programs decided to join religious orders. Others became deacons. Others attending these programs came away feeling they've been called to be more involved with their parishes and the Church. His department also promotes Faith Clubs – for older teens and young adults. There are now five of these in Jefferson County.

The Archdiocese also has a collaborative program with Loyola University so that people in our area can earn certificates or degrees through programs that are partly online and partly involving local gatherings.

Near the end of Art's presentation, Fr. Joe Voor and Fr. Pat Dolan also spoke up to remind us that at one time the Church never taught us how to discuss our faith with others, as if it was all about "God and me." They reminded us that Art's presentation is all about the central message of Vatican II. It was even stated that the Church once thought every Catholic adult should have six weeks of formation every year.

Fr. Joe and Fr. Pat also reminded us that we should be able to talk about our faith without necessarily attempting to convert others. We were also reminded that Jesus Christ *is* the Catholic Church – a missing ingredient – one that Vatican II promoted.

We want to thank Art for a presentation that generated a lot of discussion in this meeting.

FR. TOM BOLAND SPOKE AT OUR FEBRUARY 19 MEETING

Our speaker for this meeting was Fr. Tom Boland; and he discussed "Signposts On Our Spiritual Journey."

Fr. Tom was born and raised in Louisville, an on-



ly child in his family, which belonged to Christ the King parish. He attended Flaget High School, St. Thomas Seminary, and St. Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore. He was ordained May 8, 1965. So, he's been a priest for 53 years this May!

Over the years, Fr. Tom has had assignments at Trinity High School, the Family Relations Center, the Family Ministries Office, St. Therese Parish, Holy Spirit Parish, and St. Patrick Parish. He was also the Consultor for the Priests Council for seven terms, and has a Certification in Spiritual Direction from Sacred Heart University.

Now that Fr. Tom is retired, he helps out at St. Edwards Parish.

Fr. Tom said that there is one thing we all have in common – we are on a journey. "Journey" is defined as an act of traveling from one place to another. Yet, our lives of filled with journeys – some of them ordinary, and some very extraordinary. Some might take three minutes and others might take weeks.

Along the way, there are various signposts, some

of them very important (e.g., traffic lights, stop signs, maps, and GPS devices).

Life is also a metaphor for a spiritual journey – one whereby we are going home to God, the end of life, and eternity.

In the spiritual journey, we also have signposts. The first is prayer – e.g., Sunday Mass, private prayer, the Rosary, prayers to patron saints, grace before meals, etc.

Another signpost consists of the Scriptures, which give us a lot of guidance for the journey. We can use Scriptures in many ways along the journey – for example, in liturgies, as daily devotionals, and in Lectio Divina (see http://ocarm.org/en/content/lectio/what-lectio-divina).

Yet another signpost consists of the many forms of spiritual reading available to us. There is classical reading, as in the writings of the saints, as well as contemporary reading – such as things by Thomas Merton (http://merton.org/chrono.aspx), St. Teresa of Calcutta

(<u>http://www.catholic.org/clife/teresa/quotes.php</u>), or Pope Francis

(<u>https://www.facebook.com/PopeFrancis.Video.Homilies.Writings.Articles/</u>).

Some signposts help us know where we are, maybe telling us the distance to our destination or telling us of a scenic vista around the corner, or keeping us from getting lost.

On the spiritual journey, how do we navigate? Are we paying enough attention? What feels right? What gives us a sense of being fed on the journey? What draws us closer to God? Are we bored? Do we feel our prayer life is too dry? Is it time to change the form of our prayers?

The Holy Spirit is talking to us in gentle whispers. Our own curiosity can lead us to new thoughts, directions, actions, and interests. This might result in our buying a certain book for spiritual reading, or joining a specific program or book club during Lent, or even making a weekend retreat (see

https://www.saintmeinrad.org/retreats/ and https://mountsaintfrancis.org/retreat-offerings).

Fr. Tom had a handout with some popular authors, suggested readings, and other ideas. Here are some of those ideas:

Popular authors include Bishop Robert Barron (https://www.wordonfire.org/), Fr. William Barry, SJ,

Fr. Paul Coutina, SJ, Fr. Thomas Merton, OCSO, Fr. James Martin, SJ, Fr. Henri Nouwen, Fr. Ronald Rolheiser, Fr. Richard Rohr, OSF, Matthew Kelly, and Robert Wicks.

On the subject of a new cosmology, Fr. Tom recommends Judy Cannato's "Radical Amazement" and "Field of Compassion."

By Pope Francis, Fr. Tom recommended "Laudato Si" and "Amoris Laetitiae."

On Centering Prayer, Fr. Tom recommended the "Contemplative Outreach" app, as well as materials by Trappist Monk Fr. Thomas Keating, OCSO (who is alive, in his 90's, has several books, and dozens of free videos online).

The Center for Action and Contemplation, founded by Fr. Richard Rohr, can be found at https://cac.org/, where you can also subscribe to a weekly or daily email meditation.

Fr. Tom also said there are a number of websites and smart phone apps that offer daily Mass readings and reflections, the Liturgy of the Hours, etc. Some of the free apps include the Laudate app, Reimagining the Examen app, the Centering Prayer app, and the Sacred Space app.

We want to thank Fr. Tom Boland for his insightful spiritual direction.
