MARK CASPER SPOKE AT OUR MARCH 5 MEETING

Our speaker for this meeting was Mark Casper, Executive Director for St. Elizabeth Catholic Charities (SECC). Mark joined us to give us an update on this local charity.

Mark was born and raised in Louisville. He has eight siblings in the Louisville area, plus one in Bardstown, and one in Florida. He graduated from Bishop David High School in 1979 and UofL in 1983. He has been married for 27 years and has twin daughters who both graduated from IUS this past spring. Mark joined SECC in 2008, after serving on their board for a year.

Also joining us from SECC were Jennifer McVeigh-Davis, the Social Services Director, as well as Fran Brown and Deacon Charlie Brown, two of their volunteers.

This agency is owned by the Archdiocese of Indianapolis, but its programs operate primarily in southern Indiana and the Louisville Metro area. About 28% of their financial support comes from the Louisville side of the river; and about a third of their board of directors are from Louisville. Although they don't do disaster relief programs, they did set up an office in Henryville for two years after that town was dramatically damaged by tornadoes.

The organization was named after St. Elizabeth of Hungary (1207-1231), who was born into a royal family, but chose to live simply, devote herself to works of charity for the poor and the sick, and give away much of her family's wealth.

SECC started as a maternity home, and has grown to now own eight buildings, offering a number of family-oriented social services, primarily helping women and their children. They have three shelter programs for unwed mothers.

Their eight programs include a Women & Children's Emergency Shelter; a Family Stability Program; Affordable Supportive Housing; an adoption agency; a counseling program; Marie's Community Distribution Program; a Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA) program; and a Supported Living Program.

The average person placed

with them is a 26-year old woman with one or two children, who is pregnant and has decided to give up her next child for adoption.

Their staff of 16 full-time employees, and 16 parttime employees (who live in the homes with the women residents), is assisted by many local volunteers, including many high school students doing service hours.

Mark shared with us many facts about the nature of social service work. For every one child ready for adoption, SECC has 30 couples seeking to adopt a child. From 2013 to 2017, the number of children in need of services has tripled. Indiana is a more adoption-friendly state than Kentucky. Their 15 to 20 adoptions per year are unrelated to their shelter services.

They take all sorts of donations, in addition to cash; in-kind donations were worth \$260,000 last year. They have an annual gala to raise funds. They were just approved for a \$50,000 grant from the Women's Foundation of Southern Indiana, for funds to be applied toward training the mothers in various skills, to make them more employable. Items donated are put to use right away or given away within the week. They get a lot of support from nine local churches.

Their Supported Living Program helps adults and children with developmental delays. They currently have 16 clients in this program. Some have been there for over 25 years.

FR. PETER DO WAS OUR SPEAKER AT THE MARCH 19 MEETING.

Our speaker for this meeting was Fr. Peter Do, Associate Vocation Director for the Archdiocese. He joined us to give us an update on the Vocations Office.

Fr. Peter was born in Saigon, Vietnam in 1971. And he came to the U.S. as a teenager in May of 1990. He graduated from Seneca HS, St. Meinrad, and the Mundelein Seminary for Theology in Illinois.

He was ordained to the priesthood June 8, 2002. His parish assignments have been St. James in Elizabethtown, St. Bartholomew, and St. Ignatius. For the last two years he has been pastor for both St. Gregory in Cox's Creek and St. Monica in Bardstown

Fr. Peter reminded us that when he first joined the seminary, Serran Tom Ransdell was working in the Vocations Office, and the two of them got to know each other very well.

Fr. Peter also has a strong passion for supporting seminarians. In fact, he's been instrumental in getting all four of our current Vietnamese seminarians to come to Louisville. As pastor at St. Bartholomew parish, he had a large rectory; and he opened it up to our seminarians, hosting over 90% of them while he was assigned to that parish. He said this was a factor in his being appointed to his current role with the Vocation Office.

Talking about Vietnam, he explained that although the communist government in that country has many restrictions on the Catholic Church, there is still a lot of interest in the priesthood there. About 400 young men apply to be seminarians each year; but the diocese can only take eight to ten into the program. Due to the demand, the diocese only takes seminarians under age 23. Older men still wanting to pursue the priesthood can look into joining an order of priests. The Church in Vietnam is always looking for people who are willing

to come to Vietnam to teach English, so their seminarians can come to the U.S. for further studies.

The Vietnamese communist government does not allow students to study philosophy; and young men can study theology and pastoral ministry only after completing college. The

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government requires seminarians to study communism before they can be ordained. Government interference with the Church varies throughout the country, being the worst in the big cities.

For this fall, there are four or five men in discernment to possibly join the seminary for our own Archdiocese. Also, the Archdiocese is

considering two seminarians who may come from the Dominican Republic.

The Vocations Office will be hosting one or more St. Andrews dinners this year - usually a small number of high school aged young men recommended by their pastors. These gatherings consist of a social hour and a meal, followed by a talk and/or a video on vocations. Then the Vocations Office stays in touch with any of these young men who continue to show an interest in the priesthood. This program has been in operation for a couple of years and replaces (along with the Marian Dinners for young ladies) the Dinner With the Archbishop, which used to attract hundreds of youth every year – too many for one-onone discernment discussions.

Fr. Peter said that in a number of cases, the first contact is initiated by the young man interested in discerning a vocation. The Archdiocese also utilizes a number of social media connections.
