AT OUR APRIL 2 MEETING, SR. RUTH ANN HAUNZ WAS OUR SPEAKER

Our Speaker for this meeting was Sr. Ruth Ann Haunz, OSU – a member of the Ursuline Sisters. She spoke on "The Francis Center - A Model for Outreach." The Francis Center is an outreach program of St. John Paul II parish in the Hikes Point / Buechel area of Louisville.

Sr. Ruth Ann was born on her family's farm in Oldham County, Kentucky. She lived there until she entered the convent.

Her family was active in St. Aloysius Parish, Pewee Valley. She attended St. Aloysius Grade School, which was a small four-room school at the time.

Sr. Ruth Ann graduated from Sacred Heart Academy, Spalding

College, the University of Dayton (with a Masters in Theological Studies), and Bellarmine University (with a Masters in Spirituality). She is also a credentialed Spiritual Director.

Sr. Ruth Ann has seven siblings - three sisters in the Cincinnati area and three brothers and a sister in the Oldham County / Louisville area.

She was a high school teacher and youth retreat director (13 years), the Ursuline Vocation Director (six years), a Pastoral Associate (24 years), part of the Ursuline Sisters Leadership (six years), as well as a Retreat and Spiritual Director (while in other ministries). She's been a member of the Ursuline order for over 50 years, having joined the order in 1964 and professing her vows in 1967.

Sr. Ruth Ann's current ministry is working as the Manager of the Francis Center Kid's Café. She also assists the Francis Center's executive director with various other opportunities, as well as some publicity and communication.

When Sr. Ruth Ann was asked about other aspects of her life, she said she treasures her rural background and the values and love that her parents shared with her and her siblings. She loves to cook and share hospitality. Inviting and nurturing volunteers is one of her gifts.

The Francis Center is the result of Pope Francis' urging that parishes take care of the people in their neighborhoods and not necessarily beyond. A demographic study of the Buechel area was done by Bellarmine students that determined the need for this outreach program. The Center is partly supported by grants and donations; and it is located in the old school building on the Hikes Lane campus of St. John Paul II parish. All services are provided free of charge, focusing on health, healing, and hospitality. There are several activities designed for seniors.

Sr. Ruth Ann described the services of Kid's Café. There are 33 sites – most of them in the central West End. They are supported by the Dare to Care Program. There are five schools served by the Francis Center (about 50 children in grades 1 through 9). Goldsmith and Klondike schools have many kids needing good nutrition. The Center volunteers, 70 adults and 50 youth (including senior citizens and high school students), provide homework help. Dare to Care provides the hot meals. The Kid's Café follows the Jefferson County Public Schools' schedule. Sister coordinates the volunteers' schedules. There are three people in the kitchen who receive the food and serve it. The Center staff also minister to the families of the kids *and* to those who volunteer. They

minister to refugee and immigrant families, so there are also language differences. Sister told the story of a widow with four boys who came from Syria and the problems this family faced and how the Center staff helped them.

Ann said there is a reward for getting involved by working with people who have problems and need help - building these relationships is contagious. Her OSU Community life fits in with her daily work; and her community supports her in her work. The Center won the Bobby Ellis Award for its food program. The Francis Center also has a 63-plot community garden, and a waiting list of people wanting to use it. They also offer marriage and individual counseling.

AT OUR APRIL 16 MEETING ARCHBISHOP KURTZ WAS OUR SPEAKER

Archbishop Joseph Kurtz joined us to talk on "The Gift of Religious Liberty." He started by thanking us and saying the Serrans can be proud of the culture of vocations we foster in our Archdiocese. He said we can all be proud, too, that we had three new transitional deacons ordained this year and five deacons who will be ordained to the priesthood in May.

He also wanted to thank us for organizing our monthly Holy Hours for Vocations.

The Archbishop spoke of a recent letter to the editor of the Courier Journal – a letter that criticized



the Archbishop and us Catholics for many things, including our belief that marriage should only be between one man and one woman. The Archbishop talked about his response to that letter, in his April 15 Courier Journal opinion column, which can be found at

Pope Francis has spoken much on religious liberty, including when he visited the U.S. in 2015. "Comments on religious liberty can easily be misunderstood," said Archbishop Kurtz. Some of our most important freedoms are not giv-

en by the state, but by God. In the U.S. we have rights protected by the Constitution

(<u>http://constitutionus.com/</u>). And our Declaration of Independence

(http://www.ushistory.org/declaration/document/) says "that all men are created equal, that they are

endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness."

Not all countries have these protections of human rights. And now, even in the U.S., people want



to debate the meaning of these rights, and even the existence of the Creator referred to in the Declaration of Independence.

"Faith is personal but not private," said the Archbishop. He recently reminded newly confirmed eighth graders that the choice to be confirmed is a public action.

He reminded us that "religious liberty is the cornerstone of a society that promotes human dignity."

In 1965, when the Second Vatican Council was in session, the Church hierarchy spoke much of religious freedom, and suggested that we are not to "impose" our will on others, but "propose" our beliefs.

In "Dignitatis Humanae" (the Second Vatican Council document on religious freedom, at http://www.vatican.va/archive/hist_councils/ii_vatic an council/documents/vat-

<u>ii_decl_19651207_dignitatis-humanae_en.html</u>), the Church hierarchy spoke of freedoms, with certain



limitations on governments. The Archbishop said that the test of "strict scrutiny" calls for (1) the individual's religious beliefs to be "sincerely held" (e.g., not just a hoax to avoid taxes); (2) the need for government to have compelling reasons to limit cer-

tain freedoms; and (3) the need for government to seek the least restrictive way to solve problems of freedom (e.g., you don't use a machine gun to get rid of a fly in the room).

Archbishop Kurtz spoke of a committee formed by the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) that currently focuses on three areas



of national interest: (1) the Conscience Protection Act would, for example, address the cases in which nurses are given a choice to either assist with an abortion or be fired. (2) The Child Welfare Provider Inclusion Act would allow child welfare organizations, including adoption and foster care providers, to make placement determinations based on the provider's "religious beliefs or moral convictions." (3) The First Amendment Defense Act would prevent the federal government from discriminating against individuals or institutions based on their beliefs about marriage.

In our present culture, if one person disagrees with us, we are tempted to be quiet. But, "we can't be apologetic about our religious freedoms," said the Archbishop. Too often we are only "shouting at each other, not using logic," he said.

He also said that, this year, the Fortnight for Freedom will be replaced by the Week of Religious Freedom, running from June 22 through June 29, with a number of local discussions and videos on related topics. The Archbishop also reminded us that, like parents raising children, we are long-distance runners, working hard now for the fruits to be harvested down the road.

We want to thank Archbishop Kurtz for his wonderful presentation.
