FR. PAT DOLAN SPOKE AT OUR MAY 7 MEETING

Fr. Pat, Pastor at St. Teresa of Calcutta Parish, gave us a presentation on "Islam and the Inquisition." He spoke specifically on the Spanish Inquisition, not to be confused with other inquisitions.

At the end of the Roman Empire, the Visigoths converted to Arians and then later slowly converted to true Christianity. This occurred from the 400's through the 600's. In the late 500's, Muhammad (the founder of Islam) had visions that resulted in the mobilizing of Muslim communities and, in the year 711, the invasion of Spain. The Muslims were almost defeated; but they did end up taking over Spain. The French rallied against the Muslims. And around the year 800, King Charlemagne drove many of the Muslims south to the Ebro River in the northeast of Spain. The famed Santiago de Compostela in northwestern Spain was another rallying point against the Muslims.

The Muslims basically took the attitude that the people they conquered were to either convert to Islam (the religion of the Muslims) or be killed. For them, Islam was not just a religion, but also their politics. However, in Iraq, Syria, and Egypt, the Muslims sometimes allowed small Christian communities to survive without converting to Islam, thinking those communities would eventually die out.

In Spain, many Christians were able to hide out in the mountains or keep a low profile so as not to be executed. Compared to their African existence, the Muslims liked Spain and flourished there. In the 11th century, during the time of El Cid, the military leader in medieval Spain, the Crusades were going on; and the Christians, including some from England, pushed Christianity further south – thus pushing Muslim control further south in Spain.

By the mid-1200's, Portugal had helped expand Christianity, and caused the Muslims in Spain to be moved even further south. As a result, Muslim control was limited to Granada – a small area in southern Spain. However, by this time, the population of all of Spain included Christians, Jews, and people who had been influenced by Greek ideas, as well as the Muslim minority. In addition, the various Rites of Christianity were in competition with one another.

To complicate matters further, there were cabalistic thinkers – mystics whose approach to religion depended a lot on the interpretations of numbers. To many of the uneducated, it was understood that with the right words by a priest, bread and wine could be

converted into the body and blood of Christ. This made it hard to reject the "magic" of the cabalistic thinkers.

In the 1300's, the black plaque wiped out many people, but the clergy disproportionately, since they tended the sick and administered the sacraments. Consequently, the education of seminarians by the clergy also suffered.

All of these factors contributed to confusion and a lessening of the true Catholic education of the masses of Christians.

The Roman Christians, including the states supportive of Rome, decided it was time to clean up Christianity. The Catholic Monarchs, King Ferdinand and Queen Isabela of Spain, also participated in this exercise to maintain the Roman Catholic orthodoxy in their country. The Spanish Inquisition was



established to ask questions, find the sources of errors, and get rid of the errant thinking within the Church. The problem was that people could falsely accuse others of disseminating the non-truths, sometimes resulting in torture and even the death of people accused of teaching non-truths. Oftentimes, it was the state, and not the Church, that were taking the punishments too far. The purpose of the inquisition was always and only to give the true faith the chance to be understood correctly: never to punish, only to heal.

What about today? Radical Muslims still feel that Spain belongs to them. New generations of people even in the Americas are confused by all of this. Spain has become more tolerant of Jews and Muslims. However, Spain is primarily Catholic while Morocco, just across the Mediterranean Sea in northern Africa, is primarily Muslim.

We want to thank Fr. Pat Dolan for his presentation, which was very informative.

DEACON LUCIO CARUSO SPOKE AT OUR MAY 21 MEETING

Deacon Lucio Caruso joined us to speak on the topic "Integration of Word, Worship, and Charity." Deacon Lucio works with Catholic Charities and is also assigned to Epiphany parish.

He was born in Italy, an only child, and came to the United States when he was a year and a half old. He grew up in Jackson, Michigan, earning his B.A. in Theology and Social Science at Aquinas College in Grand Rapids Michigan. In the diocese of Grand Rapids, he served for 32 years, in parishes and in many other capacities - including education, pastoral ministry, and social service.

He earned a Masters in Pastoral Theology from



Saint Mary of the Woods College in Terra Haute, Indiana. Lucio has been married for over 30 years. He and his wife, Therese, have two grown sons, and three grandchildren.

Deacon Lucio has been here in Louisville and with Catholic Charities for the last 10 years. He currently serves as Director of Mission for Catholic Charities and previously served as director of its local social service programs. He was ordained to the permanent diaconate for the Archdiocese on Aug 21 of 2010 and was assigned to Epiphany Catholic Church.

Deacon Lucio, age 63, spoke first of his life journey and growth into the diaconate. He loves life and love itself; and he reminded us that the Scriptures tell us "God is love."



He reminded us that Pope Benedict XVI, in his encyclical "God is Love" (http://w2.vatican.va/content/benedict-xvi/en/encyclicals/documents/hf_ben-xvi_enc_20051225_deus-caritas-est.html) said "love for widows and orphans, prisoners, and the sick and needy of every kind, is as essential to her (*the Church*) as the ministry of the sacraments and preaching of the Gospel. The Church cannot neglect the service of charity any more than she can neglect the Sacraments and the Word." Caring for each other, practicing love and charity, are essential to our beliefs and to the life of the Church.

Deacon Lucio said that love and charity are so important to who we are that they are "sacramentalized" in our service to others.

He told us the story of how the revival of the diaconate within the Church came from discussions among priest prisoners in the concentration camps at Dachau during the Holocaust. (In addition to six million Jews killed in the Holocaust, another five million non-Jews were killed. In 1940, the Priest Barracks of the Dachau Concentration Camp was established. Of 2,720 clergy imprisoned at Da-

chau, 95% were Catholic.) These prisoners asked themselves how their faith allowed society to get to the point where the Holocaust could occur. A German theologian and Jesuit priest, Fr. Karl Rahner, also wrote about these discussions, as well as the diaconate, and was instrumental in the Second Vatican Council's restoration of the diaconate, even for married men.

Deacon Lucio spoke of the deacon's "love of neighbor and the altar." Even when a bishop is the main celebrant, it is the deacon who proclaims the Gospel and sends us forth at the end of the Mass – some of the same functions early Church deacons performed.

Deacons are to be a driving force in the life of the Catholic community. They are to "cheerlead, animate, and excite people" to live the good life in love and service. They are to help us see the intersection of the Sacraments, the Word, the Eucharist, and living out our lives of love and service. Deacon Lucio said some deacons speak of the Mass as having three parts – the liturgy of the Word, the liturgy of the Eucharist, and the liturgy of the World (the dismissal into the world).

Human needs are great and can even be overwhelming. We could easily despair. But the Church helps us to be rooted back into the Scriptures and the Sacraments each weekend, reminding us of Church teaching and that we are part of a community that exists to help one another. The "parish community is where we get loved" he said.

Deacon Lucio also spoke of his work with Catholic Charities, which is part of Catholic Charities, USA, which is part of Caritas International. Through the connection of all these organizations, the Church can respond to service the needs on every continent.

We want to thank Deacon Lucio Caruso for his love of the Church; his enthusiasm for love, charity, and service; and for his time in speaking to the Serra Club of Louisville.
