

SISTER MICHELE INTRAVIA SPOKE AT OUR NOVEMBER 18 MEETING

Sr. Michele Intravia, of the Ursuline Sisters of Mount St. Joseph, was our speaker for the November 18 meeting. She has been with the <u>Sister Visitor Center</u> for 15 years, and its Director for the last eight years.

Sr. Michele was born and raised in St. Louis, Missouri, on The Hill, which is the Italian Section of the city. She attended Bishop DuBourg High School and Fontbonne College (St. Louis). She then completed her Bachelor's Degree at Brescia University (Owensboro). She entered the Ursuline Sisters in

1979. She has two older sisters, eight nieces and nephews, 13 great nieces and nephews, a great-great-nephew, and a great-great-niece.

She also did missionary work in Chile for two years, and was an educator for 13 years, including six years as a principal. She said the hardest day of her life was the day she had to close down her home parish school in St. Louis.

The Sister Visitor Center (SVC) is one of the nine divisions of Catholic Charities of Louisville, and is celebrating 50 years of serving in West Louisville. It is an emergency crisis center in West Louisville, serving the poor in the Shawnee, Russell, and Portland areas – everything west of the Ninth Street divide and north of Broadway to the river.

The SVC was originated by the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth, but Ursuline Sisters have always worked there, too. Today, there are two Ursuline Sisters and two lay women running the Center.

They help families with financial needs (utility bills, rent bills, and preventing evictions). They are one of the 14 area ministries throughout Jefferson County. The SVC operates a clothes closet, and also coordinates the distribution of food from Dare to Care.

Forty-five percent of their budget comes from



grants and private donations. They are also supported by regional churches, the Pax Christi Collaborative, the K of C, Catholic Charities, the Metro Government, individual volunteers, the Catholic Service Appeal, and individual donations of cash, food and clothing. Many of our parishes support them with food, cloth-

ing and cash on a regular basis. Even football's Hall of Fame (and Louisville's own) Paul Hornung is a big supporter of the SVC.

To do their work, they have "financial appointments" and "clothing appointments" with people to determine their needs, and to be sure that food, clothing and money is going where it is really needed. They require paperwork and ID's to be sure people are who they say they are. For financial assistance, they also require things like utility cut-off notices and eviction notices.

In October they distributed food to 767 people. Year round, they serve 10,000 people. For Christmas they'll try to help 200 children with new clothes,

shoes, hats, gloves, and coats. Sr. Michele said that 95% of the poor they serve are not Catholic. She reminded us that "we're not serving them because *they* are Catholic, but because *we* are Catholic."

When she gets overwhelmed or frustrated with people testing her patience, she reminds herself to "Suck it up, Buttercup!"

Speaking at Masses for the parishes of the Pax Christi Collaborative, she challenged them to raise \$4,000 to help with the SVC needs. The parishes came through with \$5,000 instead.

With a core base of only 20 weekly volunteers, they can always use many more volunteers. Although SVC gets middle-schoolers and high-schoolers from parish youth groups, students working on service hours, and others, it is still very hard to get volunteers due to some people's reluctance to drive to West Louisville.

Sr. Michele says they welcome all the volunteers and prayers they can get, as well as donations of food, clothing, and financial assistance.

We want to thank Sr. Michele for meeting with us and giving us an update on the Sister Visitor Center.

INDULGENCES

HELP A DECEASED FRIEND OR RELATIVE OUT OF PURGATORY

A) THEOLOGY - The Catholic Church teaches that Christ became man, suffered, died, and rose from the dead. All of this was to save us from our sins. In doing so, Christ left an infinite treasury of graces for our benefit. He also gave Peter, and thus all his successors, the Keys to the Kingdom of Heaven. Consequently, the Church has the power to dispense from this treasury. The Church also teaches that when our sins are forgiven, we still need to be purified (through our good deeds and sufferings on earth, as well as our experience of Purgatory after death) before entering Heaven.

However, the experience of Purgatory can be reduced (by *partial indulgences*) or even fully eliminated (by *plenary indulgences*) if we take on certain devotions, some of which are relatively simple.

- **B)** WHO CAN BENEFIT Indulgences can normally be applied to *oneself* or to *one of the souls of the deceased*, but they cannot be applied to another *living* person. (Norm 3)
- C) **DEVOTIONS FOR EARNING INDULGENCES** An indulgence can be obtained in a number of ways, as long as you meet all of the requirements. The "<u>Manual of Indulgences</u>" (see footnotes) lists dozens of ways to earn indulgences. Here are just <u>some</u> of the simpler devotions that can be used to obtain a <u>plenary</u> indulgence, when combined with the requirements in Part D below. (Only one <u>plenary</u> indulgence can be earned each day.)
 - 1) On the last Sunday before Advent, the Feast of Christ the King, publicly recite the act of dedication of the human race to Christ the King. (See Grant 2 of the *Manual*, which also contains the dedication prayer.)
 - 2) Thirty minutes of Eucharistic Adoration. (Grant 7)
 - 3) Spend at least three entire days in the exercise of a spiritual retreat. (Grant 10)
 - 4) Lenten Good Friday adoration of, and kissing of, the Cross (Grant 13)
 - 5) The pious exercise of the Way of the Cross must be done before the Stations of the Cross, moving from one station to the next as you pray and meditate on each. (Those who are "impeded" from such movement can pray a half hour in pious reading and mediation on the Passion and Death of Christ.) (Grant 13)
 - 6) Recitation of the Rosary (5 decades) and meditation on the mysteries, in a church, a family group, or a pious association. (Grant 17)
 - 7) On January 1 or the Feast of Pentecost -- recitation of "Come, Holy Spirit, Creator Blest" ("Veni Creator"); Grant 26; the words can be found here: http://www.preces-latinae.org/thesaurus/Hymni/VeniCreator.html.
 - 8) Renewal of one's Baptismal promises on the anniversary of the date of your baptism.

- 9) All Souls Day visit a church, reciting the Our Father and the Creed. (Grant 29)
- **10)** Visit a cemetery from Nov 1 through Nov 8 (cannot be applied to oneself, but only to the souls in Purgatory) and devoutly pray for the deceased. (Grant 29)
- 11) Thirty minutes of devout Scripture reading and meditation. (Grant 30)
- 12) Attend the first Mass of a newly ordained priest. (Grant 37)
- **13)** Piously and devoutly receive, even by radio or television, the Blessing of the Pope when imparted to Rome and the world (Urbi et Orbi, is usually given on Christmas Day and Easter Sunday). (Grant 4)
- 14) Devoutly visit your parish church either on the feast day of the Saint for whom it is named or on the 2nd of August when the indulgence of the "Portiuncula" occurs. In your visit, recite one Our Father and the Creed. (Grant 33)
- **D) REQUIREMENTS FOR A PLENARY INDULGENCE** In order to obtain a *plenary* (full) indulgence, one of the devotions described above (see others in the *Manual*) must be performed; *and all* of the following items 1 through 4 below are *also* required:
 - 1) <u>Intention</u> In order to qualify for any (partial or plenary) indulgence, we must have the *intent* to earn the indulgence. (Norm 17)
 - 2) State of grace / detachment from sin In addition to having been baptized and not excommunicated, we must have the interior disposition of complete detachment from sin, even venial sin, in order to qualify for a plenary indulgence. (Norm 17) Some experts consider this the most difficult requirement in obtaining a plenary indulgence.
 - 3) <u>Sacraments</u> (Norm 20, regarding plenary indulgences) In addition to the devotion, you must also
 - a) Sacramentally confess your sins (within 20 days before or after the devotion);
 - b) Receive the Holy Eucharist (also within 20 days). Although one Confession can be applied to many indulgences, <u>separate receipt of the Eucharist is required</u> for each <u>plenary</u> indulgence.
 - 4) <u>Pope's Intention</u> (Norm 20, regarding plenary indulgences) We must pray for the intention of the Pope.
 - a) An "Our Father" and a "Hail Mary" are suggested.
 - b) The Pope's intentions change each month and, for **2019**, can be found at http://popesprayerusa.net/popes-intentions/.

- E) PARTIAL INDULGENCE Although a plenary indulgence can be acquired only once in the course of a day, a partial indulgence can be acquired multiple times. Without meeting

- the requirements in paragraphs (C) and (D) above, the indulgence will only be a *partial* indulgence. (Norm 18)
- F) SOUND TOO SIMPLE? Does this sound too simple for eliminating a person's entire Purgatory experience? Yes! However, consider the story of Naaman, a commander in the Old Testament (2 Kings 5).
 - Naaman was told, by a messenger of the great prophet Elisha, that he could rid himself of leprosy by simply washing in the Jordan River. Naaman could not accept Elisha's suggestion because the great prophet himself would not come out to see him personally; washing in the Jordan seemed too simple; the Jordan was not as clean as some other rivers; and Naaman was not required to pay any of the gold or silver he brought to Elisha. However, after a servant reasoned with him, Naaman did what the prophet said; and he was totally cured!
- G) ALL INDULGENCES For a brief list of <u>all</u> the indulgences in the Manual of Indulgences, both plenary and partial, see https://www.catholic.org/prayers/indulgw.php. In that list, the <u>plenary</u> indulgences are in all capitals. This list is probably a little easier to read than the *Manual*, which is not as user-friendly.
