Live in a manner worthy of the call you have received, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another through love, striving to preserve the unity of the spirit through the bond of peace:

One body and one Spirit,
as you were also called to the one hope of your call;
one Lord, one faith, one baptism;
one God and Father of all,
who is over all and through all and in all.
Therefore, putting away all falsehood,
speak the truth, each one to his neighbor,
for we are members one of another.

REFLECTION: Excerpt from address of His Holiness Pope Francis for the opening of the Synod, 9 October, 2021.

"You have come by many different roads and from different churches, each bearing your own questions and hopes. I am certain the Spirit will guide us and give us the grace to move forward together, to listen to one another and to embark on a discernment of the times in which we are living, in solidarity with the struggles and aspirations of all humanity. I want to say again that the Synod is not a parliament or an opinion poll; the Synod is an ecclesial event and its protagonist is the Holy Spirit. If the Spirit is not present, there will be no Synod.

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And so, brothers and sisters, let us experience this moment of encounter, listening, and reflection as a season of grace that, in the joy of the Gospel, allows us to recognize at least three opportunities. First, that of moving not occasionally but structurally towards a *synodal Church*, an open square where all can feel at home and participate. The Synod then offers us the opportunity to become a *listening Church*, to break out of our routine and pause from our pastoral concerns in order to stop and listen.

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Finally, it offers us the opportunity to become a *Church of closeness*. Let us keep going back to God's own 'style,' which is closeness, compassion and tender love."

Every session of the Second Vatican Council began with the prayer Adsumus Sancte Spiritus, the first word of the Latin original meaning, "We stand before You, Holy Spirit," which has been historically used at Councils, Synods and other Church gatherings for hundreds of years, being attributed to Saint Isidore of Seville (c. 560 - 4 April 636). The Church invites us to use this prayer for gatherings pertaining to this Synod.
