AUGUST 4 SEMINARIAN LUNCHEON

Every year we have a send-off luncheon in August, prior to our seminarians going back to their seminaries.

Our President, **Bob Hublar**, opened the meeting by welcoming everyone and thanking a number of people. He especially thanked the seminarians for attending.

Bob also thanked the Vocation office staff, most of whom were in attendance - **Fr. Martin Linebach**, the Vicar for Vocations; **Fr. Kien Nguyen**, the Associate Vocation Director; and **Kelly McLemore**, the Secretary. He also thanked Chancellor **Brian Reynolds** and Vice Chancellor **Tink Guthrie** for joining us. **Todd Popson**, the new Associate Director for Vocations, was unable to join us.

We also congratulated Archbishop Shelton on the 34th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood, which was the following day – August 5.

Archbishop Shelton Fabre led the group in saying grace before the meal. We had about 46 people in attendance.

After lunch, Archbishop Shelton thanked the Serrans and spoke of the upcoming Saturday, September 9 IGNITE Workshop which will promote Parish Vocation Ministries.

Archbishop Shelton remembered when he was younger, adult Catholics would point out to certain

young men and women that they should consider a religious vocation. He’s encouraging us to continue this tradition. He also reminded us that this day, August 4, was the feast day of St. John Vianney, patron saint of parish priests.

Fr. Martin spoke next, starting by expressing his gratitude for all our seminarians. He also told us that when he left his last assignment with the Cathedral, he was given a statue of St. John Vianney. So, he brought it to this meeting and had Archbishop Shelton bless it.

He also acknowledged his Vocation Office staff, all of whom are named above. Fr. Martin spoke of a recent gathering of the seminarians at a lake house in Indiana. He said that Todd Popson did “monumental work” for this recent, successful event. And Fr. Martin also thanked Archbishop Shelton for all he did at this retreat, especially for speaking individually with every seminarian. Fr. Martin also said his new position “would not be possible without the Archbishop,” who appointed him to be Vicar of Vocations.

We were informed by Fr. Martin that he visits every one of the seminaries we use, in both the Fall and the Spring semesters. All our seminarians do well academically, he said. He reminded us that those to be ordained in the future will be blessings for our children and grandchildren, celebrating future

baptisms and marriages, as well as caring for the sick and much more.

In addition to the 11 seminarians, which we have had in the last year, we have six new ones, who Fr. Martin spoke of as “very serious discerners.” Of all 17 seminarians, four were out of town and unable to attend the luncheon. Two of the new ones are coming from Vietnam; and one is not yet in the U.S. due to dealing with visa issues.

Fr. Martin also spoke of the Catholic Extension Society, which raises funds to help the poorer dioceses across the country, by selling calendars. Our Archdiocese has arranged to have a special vocation calendar for 2024. So, Fr. Martin encouraged us to ask our parishes to consider using Catholic Extension for next year’s calendars.

The pilot vocation program for sixth-grade students last year, called “Sequere Me” (meaning follow me), will be continued in the future.

Overall, Fr. Martin feels that our most important current mission is to develop a culture of vocations. And he thinks all of the things mentioned above will help this mission.

Fr. Martin said that there are many benefits to being the Vicar of Vocations. And one unexpected benefit is that “it has rekindled and renewed” his own priesthood – “a huge blessing,” he said.

The last five are new seminarians to the program.

It was announced that the Serra Club members collected \$5,555 to give to the Archdiocese to help fund the cost of our 50% increase in the number of seminarians. And, coincidentally, it was noted that we expect to have five new priests ordained Spring of 2024.

Archbishop Shelton Fabre then spoke for a few minutes. He started by explaining something new – called a Propaedeutic Year in the seminary. This Fall is the first year of this update to the Church's Program for Priestly Formation; and it is being used across the country.

It has been recognized that when entering the seminary for the first time, it can be a difficult adjustment from other forms of formal education. For seminarians, it's almost like moving back into their parents' home, adjusting to new rules which, for seminarians, include Liturgy of the Hours, Holy Hours, Spiritual Direction, and more.

The Propaedeutic Year is no less than one year and no more than two years. It is a year in which a group of seminarians become a separate community within

And thanks to **Kelly McLemore** and **Melody Denson** for coordinating so much of this event at the Pastoral Center.

This luncheon is always one of the highlights of the year for the St. Serra Club, giving us a chance to meet the seminarians individually and hear of their progress. And let's keep all our seminarians in our daily prayers.

Bob Hublar closed the meeting with a few comments, as well as the Serran prayer for Vocations and the Serran Prayer for the Perseverance of Vocations. Archbishop Shelton finished with a blessing.

WITH CLASSICAL CATHOLIC
HIGH SCHOOLS**

Dale Ahlquist was the speaker for this August 14 “Serra Meets” by Zoom, and is President of the [Society of Gilbert Keith Chesterton](#), creator and host of the EWTN series “G.K. Chesterton: The Apostle of Common Sense,” and Publisher of the Gilbert Magazine.

The author of five books, editor of twelve, Dale has been called “probably the greatest living au-

thority on the life and work of G.K. Chesterton.” He is a Senior Fellow of the [Chesterton Library at London](#).

An internationally renowned speaker, Dale has given more than 700 lectures at universities, conferences, and other institutions, including Yale, Columbia, Cornell, Notre Dame, Oxford, the Vatican Forum in Rome, and the House of Lords in London.

He is also the co-founder of [Chesterton Academy](#), a classical high school in Hopkins, Minnesota, which is the flagship of the [Chesterton Schools Network](#), which now includes 50 high schools worldwide. In 2020, he received a Presidential appointment to serve

on the National Board of Education Sciences.

Dale was a 1997 convert to the Catholic Church, through his studies of G.K. Chesterton (1874-1936), who himself was also a convert to Catholicism.

Chesterton wrote over 100 books, and over 1,000 essays and poems; and was also known as a great journalist. He shocked the world when in 1922, he

was received into the Catholic Church.

Chesterton's 25 stories about a character named Fr. Brown were extremely popular in the early 1900s, when it was rare for any successful writer of mysteries to have a priest as the main character. Fr. Brown was sort of considered the anti-Sherlock Holmes character, while Sherlock Holmes was considered a super hero in the world of crime-solving mysteries.

The modern day Columbo is a tribute to the Fr. Brown character, who was based on a long-time

friend of Chesterton's – a Fr. John O'Connor, with whom Chesterton was a friend for 20 years before becoming a Catholic.

Dale said that Chesterton sought the truth and “shocks you with what you already know.” He also said that a priest, doing many Confessions, is well acquainted with evil.



Dale and others, including some bishops, are supporting the cause for sainthood for Chesterton, even though Chesterton, like all humans, had his weaknesses. (He smoked, drank, and weighed 300 pounds.) Unlike the typical saint, he represents the intellectual lay person.

Dale's topic was **“Growing Our Own Priests,”** and wanted to explain how Classical Catholic Schools can help do that.

When he helped start a classical Catholic school in Minneapolis (with only 10 students the first year, the focus was on (1 Catholic, (2 Classical, and (3 Affordable. He says it's hard to start schools achieving only two of those factors; but they achieved all three.

They chose Chesterton as their Catholic patron because, as their website says, “Chesterton exemplified the Catholic faith through his wit, his clarity, his kindness, and his ability to love people with whom he disagreed, while sharing the faith in Christian charity.”

These schools have very integrated curriculums and are very different from public schools. In many schools, students are often not taught how to think. But the Chesterton Academy even offers four years of philosophy and theology, while most high schools offer neither. The Catholic faith is taught in all classes. For example, history is taught recognizing that history is actually the story of salvation. They also teach art and Gregorian Chant. The upper classes help the younger students. Drama classes are required, where students are taught that “we all must die and rise again.”

After they successfully developed the first Chesterton Academy, other people started asking how to do it. That is when they started the [Chesterton Schools Network](#), with schools all over the country

and one in Europe.

Their experience is that parents want to start the schools in order to make a difference.

A number of graduates of these schools have gone into religious vocations. In the 12 graduating classes of the Minneapolis flagship school, 18 men (one out of every eight) have gone into the seminary!

Their school in Minneapolis offers daily Mass, and even access to Confession every school day. In their junior or senior years, the students make a pilgrimage to Rome. They offer religious/spiritual retreats to all grade levels, both in the school and in outside locations.

The school has a profoundly joyful atmosphere. In fact, Chesterton once said “Joy is the gigantic secret of the Church.”

Their schools focus on the three pillars of Truth, Goodness, and Beauty. In fact, Dostoevsky said “Beauty will save the world.”

Dale says if we're not growing priests in our own Catholic schools then we are failing. And while some bishops resist the classical education movement, at the same time, they are seeking priests from foreign countries. In one diocese, the bishop realized they were getting more vocations from the classical movement than all the other Catholic schools combined. Then they decided the classical schools had to “be given a place at the table” of discussions of education and vocations.

The classical academies are a grass roots movement, not a “top-down solution.” Parents (the “primary educators”), caring about their children, are creating a solution that is very Catholic; and it happens to create religious vocations, along the way.

Some of their schools are not immediately accepted because other Catholic schools may resent being compared to the classical schools. But Dale's suggestion is just keep working on the success of the classical schools, and they will be accepted. To succeed, you also need priests who will support the schools by offering Mass and the Sacraments for the students.

for Priests and Lay Ecclesial Ministers Office for the Archdiocese of Louisville.

She coordinates the annual Presbyteral Assembly in June and the Fall Convocation, sabbaticals, priests' luncheons with Archbishop Shelton Fabre, and various workshops.

Holly's undergraduate degree focused on fine art; and she minored in business administration. Later, she pursued a master's degree in theological studies from Saint Meinrad School of Theology and Seminary. She attended the University of Notre Dame Institute for Church Life Science and Religion seminar in 2015 and a Capstone Seminar in 2017. In 2022, Holly participated in the Vatican Observatory's Astronomy for Catholic Ministers and Educators (ACME) workshop in Tucson, Arizona.

Holly taught at Saint Mary Academy and Trinity High School before joining the Office of Priest Personnel in the summer of 2022. She and her husband, Sean, raised three sons in LaGrange, Ky., and belong to Immaculate Conception parish. She and Sean now have one grandson.

Holly is excited to serve the Archdiocese of Louisville Presbyterate as she continues to understand and answer God's call on her Christian journey.

Holly said her whole job entails "ensuring our pastors and parishes prosper," "to will the good of each priest," "to encourage presbyteral brotherhood," and, for each priest, to "bring out their talents and develop their opportunities for continued growth." Holly's job is to understand the priests as much as possible and to "make it easy for the Holy Spirit by walking in charity with each priest."

After a year as a pastor, priests self-assess through a "360 survey" process, with input from their staff and others, to learn their strengths and opportunities for growth.

Holly coordinates our priests' sabbaticals. In 2024, she will coordinate two new workshops – one aimed at newly ordained priests and one for newly appointed pastors.

She also coordinates lunches, usually twice each month, used by the archbishop to spend time with priests – to create relationships. Holly says, "Archbishop Shelton Fabre is awesome at creating

relationships."

Her roles also include coordinating resources from other local and national offices, including Catholic Charities, the USCCB, the Vocation Office, and Multicultural Ministries.



Last Fall, Holly created a continuing education webpage for priests, with tabs for "international priests" (priests not ordained in the U.S.), the Office of Worship, senior priests, the Family Renewal Project, and the St. Serra Club of Louisville newsletters.

Priests can take a three-month sabbatical after seven years of service. She says the purpose of a sabbatical is to have a priest participate in an approved, formal program to help him be spiritually and pastorally more effective in his ministry – to help him in his priestly assignment and vocation.

Sabbaticals are considered a "necessary component for the ongoing conversion of archdiocesan priests." The challenge some priests have with sabbaticals is planning and scheduling them. The Office of Continuing Education for Priests covers the cost of the program, while the parish pays for the priest's assignment coverage.

Holly wants people to know that a sabbatical is different from a vacation. However, it can include time for rest, activities, recreation, and reflection, and is not to be mistaken for time away due to personal problems. That's why taking their usual day off is essential. It's tough she says, that many priests end up not getting to take their day off due to unexpected events. But trying a "staycation" is also challenging, which almost always turns into work. She strongly encourages priests to take their vacation time away from their parishes.

Holly encourages life-long formation for all of us and says, "The saddest thing is that we don't all become saints."

Priests are not required to accumulate continuing education hours. However, they are encouraged to do so and have opportunities for growth in a number of courses and gatherings in and out of the archdiocese.

We want to thank Holly for her presentation and for helping us see behind the scenes in the archdiocese.
