A) Serra breaks down its resources/tools into four categories:

- 1) Awareness Tools – to make people aware of our vocation needs, especially the shortage of priests.
- 2) Prayer Tools – various ways to pray for vocations.
- 3) Affirmation Tools – to affirm and thank priests, deacons, sisters, brothers, and seminarians.
- 4) Invitation/Encouragement Tools – for encouraging those who might be good candidates for religious vocations.

Gives the priest a unique opportunity to share the joy of his vocation with young men; by leading them in formation and helping them during the time in their lives when discernment of their vocation is central.
- 26) The Melchizedek Project - a great tool for Vocations Directors to help young men during this discernment process
- 27) Avow - A Discernment Program for Women - described as a book club and a prayer group, all rolled into one. Small-group discussion, study, and prayer as a means of mutual support for women who want to make the journey of discernment together.
- 28) Diocesan Women’s Discernment House - One of the most immersive vocational-discernment experiences currently in existence, the diocesan women’s discernment house is a Catholic household experience exclusively for women who are interested in discerning their vocation while living in community.

D) **IGNITE Workshops**

- 1) The name ‘IGNITE’ was chosen because it is all about using the S.P.A.R.K. Program - <https://serraspark.org/>.
- 2) Dr. Anne Roat, President-Elect of USA Council, spoke (October, 2022, at our Indianapolis Regional gathering) about the IGNITE Workshops, which teach parish volunteers how to start and maintain **Parish Vocation Ministries (PVMs)**, sometimes call Parish Vocation Committees).
- 3) These workshops are *not* to create more work for priests, but to get lay people to lead PVMs in the parish. The workshops help the lay person plan, by learning how to write a mission statement and do strategic planning. We need to have a Serra club member be a mentor to each parish in our Archdiocese which establishes a PVM. As of September 2023, there were about 140 parishes across the country that had attended these workshops.
- 4) Dr. Anne Roat noted some of the things they’ve learned since starting the IGNITE Workshops across the country. First, don’t expect pastors to find time to help, because they are simply too busy already. Second, deacons are very helpful. Third, mentors must continue with follow up calls. Fourth, the local director of vocations must be supportive in order for these PVMs to work.
- 5) Reason the Tools are not *all* printed in one book

- a) Website links and videos don't work in paper versions.
- b) The USA Council wanted everyone to have easy access to it for free.
- c) It cuts down on printing costs.
- 6) Content of an IGNITE workshop:
 - a) It is ideal if attendees represent 5 to 15 parishes.
 - b) The 28 SPARK tools – in 4 categories of Awareness, Prayer, Affirmation, and Invitation/Encouragement – are explained to the audience.
 - c) Eventually, after the workshop, each parish which has completed the workshop is paired with a mentor.
 - d) The workshop attendees developing strategic plans, mission statements and objectives for their parishes – customized to each parish.
 - e) They do strategic planning for parishes, recognizes the unique nature of each parish – size of parish, number of volunteers, affiliation with a religious order, whether they have a school, a youth group, number of deacons who might be able to help out, etc.
 - f) The 29th SPARK tool is to be added soon – based on Louisville's Vocation Poster & Essay Contest.

E) More detailed Parish Vocation Ministry ideas

- 1) Typical functions of parish vocations committees include, but are not limited to:
 - a) Educating the parish with pertinent information on vocations;
 - b) Promoting prayers for vocations;
 - c) Encouraging parishioners to come up with names of parishioners who could be good candidates for the priesthood, diaconate, or religious life; and
 - d) Being supportive of all priests, deacons, sisters, brothers, seminarians, and postulants.

- 7) **Develop a poster (with pictures) of all the priests, deacons, brothers and sisters (or at least those still alive) who have come from your parish.**
- It helps instill pride in the parish.
 - Saint Louis Bertrand Parish has one of these posted in their vestibule.
- 8) Mount in the back of church the annual poster prepared by the diocese showing all of our current seminarians.
- 9) New Year's resolutions regarding vocations – see the article on page 8 of <https://www.archlou.org/wp-content/uploads/2023/01/20230101-SERRA-NEWSLETTER.pdf>
- 10) **Celebrate seven important dates pertaining to vocations**
- World Day for Consecrated Life (WDCL)** – The Sunday coincident with or immediately following February 2 (the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord). In 2023 this is usually celebrated in parishes around Sunday, 2/5/23.
 - National Catholic Sisters Week (NCSW)** – Celebrated March 8 to 14 each year, regardless of the day of the week on which March 8 falls. This was just created in the last few years. It's part of Women's History Month. It starts on March 8, which is also International Women's Day.
 - Religious Brothers Day** – May 1 each year.
 - World Day of Prayer for Vocations (WDPV)** - Usually observed on "Good Shephard Sunday" the fourth Sunday of the Easter season (i.e., the third Sunday *after* Easter). In 2023 this is Sunday, 5/7/23.
 - Priesthood Sunday** - The last Sunday of September each year. In 2023, this is Sunday, 9/24/23.
 - Deacon Sunday** – The second Sunday of October each year. In 2023, this is Sunday, 10/8/23.
 - National Vocation Awareness Week (NVAW)** The week beginning on the first Sunday in November each year. In 2023, this is the week beginning on Sunday, 11/5/23.

F) Rules of thumb

- 1) “Eighty percent of priests now come from the 20% of parishes that have an active Parish Vocation Ministry.”
- 2) Sister Sarah Yungwirth, formerly with the Archdiocesan Vocation Office, told us that generally a young person needs to be told about seven times, that he or she should consider a vocation, before taking it seriously.
- 3) Father Mike Pratt, a very experienced Vocation Director for the Diocese of Tulsa, OK, recommended (in a March, 2023 Serra Meets presentation) that the following youth (both men and women) should be approached about considering a vocation – people who meet all of the following criteria:
 - a) Attending Mass regularly
 - b) Unmarried
 - c) Ages 16 to 35
 - d) Not obviously unfit due to some other issues – like being an ex-con, or a raging alcoholic, or having bipolar disorder, etc.
- 4) In the November, 2022 “Serra Meets” presentation, we were told that on average, if there are 10 young men in the discernment pipeline, one will become a seminarian this year. So, with 100 in the pipeline, you could have 10 new seminarians in a year’s time.

- 5) Surveys show that young people most interested in discussing vocations are 11-year-olds (usually 6th grade) and those in the 11th grade.
 - 6) Nationally, about 50% of seminarians do not finish seminary.
 - 7) Being approached by a priest carries a lot more weight with a young man than being approached by a lay person.
 - 8) Fr. Paul Hoelsing, President and Rector of Kenrick-Glennon Seminary, said in a 10/8/22 “Serra Meets” presentation that seminaries are not looking for men who want to hide from women or families. He said that if a young man ends up not comfortable around women, or would not make a good husband or father, then he may not be a good fit for the priesthood.
