FR. JERRY BELL, VICAR FOR SENIOR PRIESTS, SPOKE AT **OUR OCT 7 MEETING.**

Fr. Jerry Bell has been celebrating his Golden Jubilee as a priest of the Archdioceses of Louisville this year.

He is a native of Louisville and grew up in St. Brigid Church in the Highlands. He attended Trinity High School and Bellarmine College (now University).

Fr. Jerry went to St. Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore, Md. where he received his Masters Degree in Divinity.

He taught religion and led retreats at St. Xavier high School.

After his ordination in 1973 he was appointed director of Youth and Young Adult Ministry, and Associate Vocation Director. He served at St. Rita as Associate Pastor for about a year. His pastorates were: Emmanuel Catholic in Albany, Holy Cross in Burkesville, Holy Trinity in Louisville, St. Aloysius, St. Benedict and St. Clare in Bullitt and Hardin Counties, St. Augustine and Holy Name of Mary in Lebanon, Ky.

At retirement, or "re-engagement" as he prefers to call it, he resided and served at St. Rita and St. Luke: and he did an "immersion" in Spanish in Guadalajara, Mexico. Fr. Jerry told us that "priests don't really retire until they've taken their last breath."

He has served in the Worldwide Marriage Encounter, St. Meinrad Seminary's Institute of Priests Programs for newly ordained priests, and numerous archdiocesan councils, commissions, and consultative

bodies.

He presently resides at Cedar Hall, Nazareth Home Clifton: serves on the Archdiocesan Cemeteries Board, Priests' Council, and is the Vicar for Senior Priests.

He spoke of the six vicars we now have in our archdiocese - Verv Rev. Jeff Shooner, Vicar General; Very Rev. Paul Beach, Judicial



Vicar; Very Rev. Anthony Chandler, Vicar for Priests; Very Rev. Martin Linebach, Vicar for Vocations; Very Rev. Michael Tobin, Vicar for Hispanic Ministry; and Rev. Jerry Bell, Vicar for Senior Priests.

Working with him and senior priests (generally priests at age 70 or above) is a Senior Priests Committee, which includes Fr. Jerry Bell as the Chair of the Committee, several medical professionals, as well as Fathers Jim Hackett, Bob Osborne, Tony Smith, Roy Stiles, Joe Graffis, and Chuck Walker (who is to soon be Fr. Jerry's successor as the next Vicar for Senior Priests).

Fr. Jerry keeps Archbishop Shelton Fabre informed of the status of our senior priests. He spoke of the archdiocese having 64 active diocesan priests, 56 senior priests, including eight in nursing facilities. Of the 56 senior priests, around 29 are assisting parishes by subbing as celebrants for Masses. (Our directory of non-diocesan priests shows an additional 55 priests -

> 44 with various religious orders, and 11 assigned here from other dioceses.)

The major ministry of his committee is to provide information for the health, wellbeing, and long-term care needs of our senior priests who have devoted their lives to the spiritual needs of others. He envisions a secure future of care, compassion, and dignity for our senior priests. They use a publication entitled "Archdiocese of

Louisville, A Guidebook for Senior Priests (11/30/23).

Their recent projects include a Health Symposium (every two years), Nursing Care, a "Companion" program to enhance "interdependence" among us and to elicit assistance and support from brother priests to these senior priests.

He and a few other priests now live at Nazareth Home Clifton, 2021 Payne Street, where 12 suites have been designated for retired diocesan priests, with five suites currently in use, and two more priests to be moving in shortly. The old building, owned by the Sisters of Charity of Nazareth, was recently renovated, half of which was paid for by the archdiocese, and half by SCN.

The two-room suites at Nazareth Home Clifton include room, board, laundry, a kitchenette, private bath, room cleaning, wi-fi and parking. There is also a community/recreational room, an exercise room, and a laundry room. Fr. Jerry said they have "really good food."

FR. ANTHONY CHANDLER, VICAR FOR PRIESTS, SPOKE AT OUR **OCTOBER 21 MEETING.**

The Very Reverend Anthony Chandler was raised in Louisville and attended Bishop David High School. He went on to St. Meinrad after graduation where he received a BS in history. Then he attended the Catholic University of America where he earned a Bachelor of Sacred Theology. He also received an MBA from the University of Maryland.

Father Chandler was ordained in 1989 and has served many roles with the archdiocese, also working recently as President and CEO of the Catholic Charities of Fort Worth, Texas. He has also served as pastor to several parishes. His current assignment is pastor at Holy Spirit and St. Leonard. He is currently the **Vicar for Priests** for the archdiocese.

As Vicar for Priests, Fr. Anthony and the Office of Priest Personnel (OPP), are responsible for the spiritual, emotional, physical and material needs of our 64 full-time, active, diocesan priests and 56 senior or retired priests.

In addition to those numbers, we have another 55 priests who are with religious orders or working in our archdiocese but from other dioceses. Some of these, of course, are from India, Africa, Vietnam,



and Mexico. Also working with Fr. Chandler is **Patti** Vance, Secretary of the OPP and Holly McGuire, Director of the Office of Continuing Education for **Priests and Lay Ecclesial Ministers.**

The OPP provides money each year for our diocesan priests to go on retreats. And if a priest needs car repairs from an accident, above and beyond what insurance covers, the OPP comes up with the funds. They might also help retired priests if they need help with housing. If a priest needs help dealing with anxiety, counseling, etc., there is a Priests' Personnel Board that can assist them.

When anyone writes a letter to the archbishop, signed or unsigned, it is reviewed and, if necessary, investigated. These letters also go to Fr. Chandler and the OPP. If necessary, a meeting with individuals could be scheduled to deal with complaints.

The board that deals with priest assignments makes these decisions with the guidance of Archbishop Shelton Fabre. Fr. Chandler is involved in this process. With the shortage of priests, it is "tight" trying to get all needs filled while assigning priests.

Fr. Chandler is also involved in the June Presbyteral Assembly and the Fall Priests' Convocation. A perti-

nent topic in an upcoming convocation will be transgenderism.

When offering care and support for our priests, Fr. Chandler says that if we don't have local expertise, then they get it from outside of the archdiocese. He speaks of his office as being a conduit for all priests.

With the archdiocese going back to the deanery model, each of the



eight deaneries will be headed by a dean, who will be assisting Fr. Chandler by being a closer contact with the parishes, also doing parish visitations within the deanery.

When one of the religious orders running a parish chooses to bring in a new pastor, the archbishop must approve the local appointment. And Fr. Chandler's

office assists in that analysis.

Fr. Saju Vadakumpadan, C.M.I., from India, also sits on the Priests' Personnel Board.

Fr. Chandler elaborated on the recent announcement by the Biden administration of changes in visa rules. An estimated 50% of foreign-born Catholic priests and other "religious workers" in the United States might be forced to go back to their home coun

tries in the coming year. This all came about due to enhanced national security in the last 20 years and, unfortunately, religious workers have been caught up in the chaos.

He said the pastor at Mary Queen of Peace Parish must leave this year but can hopefully return in the near future. Others might not be able to return for years. Fr. Chandler said the USCCB is working with legislators to correct these problems; and he's hopeful they will be resolved in favor of the U.S. Church. One New Jersey diocese is already suing the federal government on this issue.

In answering one question, Fr. Chandler said that age 70 is still our mandatory retirement age for priests, but one can request to work beyond that age and get approved on a year-to-year basis.

When asked what keeps him up at night, he said he worries about the rare priest who struggles with his faith. To assist him in these matters, and to assist all our priests, he strongly recommends we each ask our pastors what we can do to help them.

We want to thank Fr. Chandler for his presentation and update on his status.

FR. JONATHAN ST. ANDRÉ, T.O.R., **SPOKE AT OUR OCTOBER 21 "SERRA MEETS"**

About the Speaker

Fr. Jonathan St. André is a Franciscan Friar of the Third Order Regular (T.O.R.). He currently serves as Vice President of Franciscan Life at Franciscan University of Steubenville, OH. He is a 1996 graduate of Franciscan University where he studied mental health, theology and philosophy.

Fr. Jonathan professed his vows in 2000 and received his M.Div. degree in 2005 in preparation for the priesthood. He was ordained in 2006. Fr. Jonathan also has a Master of Arts in

Franciscan Studies from St. Bonaventure University in New York and is currently pursuing an education doctorate in leadership and organization from the University of Dayton.

Fr. Jonathan has been blessed to serve in various

formation, University Campus Ministry and Formation of the Men in the Novitiate. His interests include cycling and reading. He grew up in Northern Virginia and is the oldest of four children.

His Presentation

Fr. Jonathan's talk was entitled "Let the Fire Fall: Lessons Learned about the Call of Religious Vocations."

Fr. Jonathan started with a reflection on Luke 10:1 -12 - on Christ sending out 72 men to the places he was to be visiting. Here is where Christ said, "The harvest is abundant; but the laborers are few; so, ask the master of the harvest to send out laborers for his harvest." Fr. Jonathan says this is a call to *all* vibrant and holy people. He says to, "never take for granted that we're called to cooperate with God's work."

Our prayers are efficacious he says. Maybe we can't change circumstances; but we can pray that the Lord sends laborers. We're also told, in these verses, to carry no money bags. We should acknowledge we have all we need; and we can rely on the Lord. He encourages us to model our lives, for college students, our children and our grandchildren, by sharing the Gospel.

Fr. Jonathan reminded us that the younger generation has so many choices at their fingertips, literally. They are flitting from one thing to another; they're not rooted and not grounded. Consequently, it's hard for them to hear the Holy Spirit. We need to encourage them to turn off the technology more and focus on God more.

These Scripture verses told the 72 missionaries to eat what is offered to you, heal the sick, then teach them the Gospel. Many of today's young men and

> women do need healing – from violence, pornography and more. They need maturity to grow in grace and wisdom.

> He suggests we ask young people, "What is God doing in your life? What are you passionate about and hopeful for?"


Next, he gave us lessons he's learned along the way.

The first lesson is to recognize that "to be seen and known and invited is powerful." Let young people know they are seen, known, invited, and valuable. When youth see Christ working in you, then they can feel free to sense Christ in themselves.

The second lesson he's learned is that young people need support to grow in

their roots, to be a people grounded in good soil with good roots. Otherwise, it's hard to be faithful to the role to which they're called.

The third lesson is that "Action produces clarity." Young people need the courage to take action - to

take that first step. Many have FOMO – the fear of missing out. However, small commitments can lead to larger commitments.

The fourth lesson is that we must all pray for a deep outpouring of the Holy Spirit. The Disciples needed the Holy Spirit; and so do we.

A final lesson is that a vocation is fragile. Pray for those who have responded to the call. It is still easy for them to lose their way. Pray for perseverance in their vocations.

Fr. Jonathan also spoke of the <u>Catholic Humanality Movement</u> – which helps students escape screens and reclaim human connection.

He also explained the new <u>Propaedeutic Stage</u>, being required primarily of diocesan seminarians. He describes it as a time to intentionally focus on the spiritual and human formation, before the student goes into intense academics.

Serran Birthdays this month:

Don Buckler, Nov 18 Jerry Zimmerer, Nov 27

November 24 – On this day in 1713, St. Junipero Serra, the "Apostle of California," was born and baptized in Spain. He entered the Franciscan order in 1720, two months before his 17th birthday; was ordained a Franciscan priest in 1737; spent several more years in obtaining degrees in philosophy and theology; taught college in Spain; decided in 1748 to become a missionary; traveled to Mexico in 1749; moved to California in 1768; founded the first nine of 21 Spanish missions in California; died in 1784 at the age of 70; was beatified September 25, 1988; and was canonized a saint on September 23, 2015.
