From the Diaconal Director

Dear Friends, My Dear Companions on the Journey,

Have mercy on me God in your kindness. In your compassion blot out my offense. Wash me more and more from guilt And cleanse me from my sin (Psalm 51:3-4).



During this penitential season of Lent, we find ourselves on a campaign of Christian service where — with holy fasting — we take up battle against spiritual evils. As we pray Psalm 51 in the Liturgy of the Hours each Friday morning throughout the year, we may not consider that King David offered this confession, illustrated repentance, and requested forgiveness for having orchestrated the demise of his generals so that he may take the general's wife. Psalm 51 is a simple reminder that being divinely selected and abundantly favored by God neither ensures our faithfulness, or prevents us from inflicting significant pain on others.

However, we have the grace of our sacramental life that arms us with weapons of self-restraint, fosters unity among us, and aids in the healing of our sins and divisions. Playing a crucial role in guiding us to fulfill our vocations of love, reflecting the image and likeness of God, the sacramental life empowers us with the strength necessary to live out our unique call to love and to bear witness to Christ, who embodies the way, the truth, and the life.

Our inherent need for sacraments arises from a deep-seated desire for God's grace, a gift that He wishes for us to embrace. Grace can be simply defined as "participation in the life of God," akin to how children share in their parents' lives. Without divine assistance, our ability to live righteously would be severely compromised. The holy sacraments facilitate our access to this divine help, inviting the Lord to engage actively in our daily lives while affirming our commitment to Him. In my experience teaching about sacraments in high school, I emphasized that they serve as vital connections to the Lord. They not only seek God's guidance in our moral choices amid the struggle between good and evil, but also reinforce our familial relationship with Him.

It is important to recognize that we will face challenges and must exert considerable effort to make moral decisions aligned with a righteous life. No one is exempt from trials and tribulations. While engaging in a sacramental life does not promise an absence of difficulties, the sacraments equip us with the resilience needed to persevere. \blacksquare —F. DeKarlos Blackmon

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

Our campaign of Christian service

s our lives are filled with countless Achallenges, how do we allow our faith to strengthen all we do? The Lenten season encourages us to refresh and deepen our faith. To such an extent that we discern annually our Lenten sacrifice, we purposefully ask the Lord to help us "that we may begin, with holy fasting, this campaign of Christian service, so that, as we take up battle against spiritual evils, we may be armed with weapons of selfrestraint" (Collect, Ash Wednesday).

The Lenten season provides us a 40-day period of prayer, fasting and almsgiving to recall how through baptism we shared in Christ's death, died to evil and sin and began a new life in Christ. We praise God that Jesus Christ paid it all (cf. 1 Cor 15:3; 1 Pt 2:24), for it is to him we owe a great debt of gratitude.

Therefore, let's endeavor to make time to pray and encourage those around us to pray, as we seek to desire conversation with the Lord. Let's bear witness to one another, particularly those who are not in regular practice of the faith, as we seek to imitate Christ by seeking out the lost and bringing to them the Good News. Let's minister the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the naked, the ill, and the imprisoned (cf. Mt 25:35-36), as we seek to encounter Christ through the works of justice that are pleasing to God" (CCC 2462).

May this Lent, our campaign of Christian service, help us to focus on the Lord, to remain in his gaze, to allow him into our hearts and to allow him to guide us. If we are open to it, this Lent can be the most powerful and spiritual season to date.



What attracted you to the priesthood? My uncle is a priest. Since I was young, I saw him as the one who united the families. If there was any conflict among my other uncles, or the neighbors, or even my parents, he would be the one who would come to calm things down and unite them again. The priesthood for me was a sign of unity, especially when I saw how my uncle united everybody. I wanted to be a man who bring unity to others.

Who or what influenced you to begin study for the priesthood?

There have been many priests who influenced me in my discernment. One of them was my parish associate priest, who helped a lot within my discernment. In my second year living here in the United States, I went to him and told him that I wanted to go to the seminary, but I was afraid because I did not know English. I was also afraid because I have always prayed in Kirundi, and I did not

know any prayer in English. Since then, he started to teach me the prayers. He also taught me the history of the diocese, and the basic things I needed to know.

What were you doing before the seminary? Before I joined the seminary, I was a student at Jeffersontown High School in Louisville.

Favorite saint and why? Saint Maria Goretti is my favorite saint. She was a role model for me in my first years here in the United States. The way she forgave Alexandro inspired me to also forgive those who wanted to kill my parents, forcing us to flee Burundi. Also, she is my favorite because I grew up singing in a children's choir at my home parish that was named after her.

Favorite Scripture verse and why? The compassion of Jesus (Matthew 9:35-38). This verse reminds me of the compassion that Jesus had for the people he encountered in his ministry. In a way, I see the call to priesthood coming from this compassion. God responds to the troubled and abandoned by sending them those who remind them of his love.

Hobbies? I have a lot of hobbies. Recently, my main hobbies have been playing soccer, singing, dancing, slowly learning how to play piano and the organ, and learning a new language.

Best advice you've heard in seminary? The priesthood is not a license or a right, it is a gift.

DEACON COUNCIL

Consultative bodies create opportunities for consultation, communication, and dialogue in the deliberative process. These frameworks offer engagement that transcends mere formality, ensuring that those consulted have a genuine opportunity to contribute.



The Council on the Permanent Diaconate (the Diaconal Advisory Council), a consultative body representing the diaconal community, serves to provide advice and counsel to the Archbishop and the Director of Diaconal Ministry. The Diaconal Advisory Council consists of persons appointed by the Archbishop, who strives to appoint persons to ensure the membership reflects a fair representation of the community.

DeKarlos Blackmon convened a meeting of the new Council on the Permanent Diaconate (Diaconal Advisory Council), with Arcbishop Shelton J. Fabre at Flaget Retreat Center in Louisville on Saturday, February 22.

council's mission of
coming together as one
archdiocese from all the
deaneries and how the

decisions of this council will affect the whole archdiocesan family. The archbishop explained that consultative bodies such as this play a vital role in delivering communication to our communities so while there may not always be agreement there can be greater understanding.

Archbishop Shelton expressed his hope that the council will promote the healthy life of the diaconal community and thanked all members of the council for their sacrifice of time and expertise.

Members were reminded that the role of the council is to advise the Archbishop on the community. There was especially a broad overview of the role of members, namely, to (a) promote fellowship within deaneries; (b) disseminate information; (c) respond to issues in real time; (d) bring concerns to Diaconal Ministry to manage or to add items to the next agenda depending on urgency; and (e) to ensure the importance of the respresentation of wives.

Members of the Diaconal Advisory Council are Deacon Jim Shields (Deanery 1), Deacon Lucio Caruso (Deanery 2), Deacon Mark Kelley (Deanery 3), Deacon Ken Roberts (Deanery 4), Deacon Joe Calvert (Deanery 5), Deacon Steve Heil (Deanery 6), Deacon Joe Dant (Deanery 7), Deacon Bruce Sullivan (Deanery 8), Gina Ryan, Mistianna Barnes, Deacon Dean Giulitto, Deacon Dennis Nash. Deacon Mark Preischel, and DeKarlos Blackmon.

During the initial meeting of the council, there were nominations and elections of the officers of the council.

After a few rounds of voting Deacon
Steve Heil was elected chairperson and Deacon
Mark Kelley was elected vice chairperson of the Diaconal Advisory
Council.



The Reverend Thomas Reitmeyer serves as an ecclesiastical judge, promoter of justice (ad causam), and pastor of Saint Vincent de Paul Parish in the Diocese of Austin. Ordained to the diaconate in 2014 and to the priesthood in 2015, Father Reitmeyer earned a bachelors degree in Biochemistry and Genetics from Texas A&M University; attended Holy Trinity Seminary in Irving and Saint Mary's Seminary in Houston where he earned a Master of Divinity, Master of Arts in Theology, and Bachelor of Sacred Theology; and earned a Licentiate in Canon Law from The Catholic University of America.

Father Reitmeyer served as a dispatcher, patrol officer, crime scene investigator, field training officer, and detective in the College Station Police Department before discerning the priesthood.

In addition to parochial ministry assignments, he has served the Diocese of Austin as a member of the Priestly Life and Formation Committee, director of the Early Ministry Program, Diaconate Admission and Scrutinies Committee, Priest Pension Plan and Trust Committee, Priest Personnel Board, and the Ethics and Integrity in Ministry Review Board.
