#### POPE FRANCIS DIED APRIL 21, 2025 AT AGE 88



Born Jorge Mario Bergoglio in 1936, the oldest of five siblings, to parents who immigrated to Argentina from Italy, he grew up near Buenos Aires. He was in a Catholic school run by Salesian priests. He would later say that at age 16 he knew he wanted to be a priest.

Bergoglio was ordained in 1969 to the Jesuit order and led the Argentine Jes-

uits starting at age 36. He was appointed the Archbishop of Buenos Aires in 1998. He was made a cardinal in 2001.

After Pope Benedict XVI resigned, Cardinal Bergoglio was chosen the 266<sup>th</sup> successor to St. Peter in March of 2013; and he took the name of Pope Francis, after St. Francis of Assisi. He was the first Jesuit and Latin American pope.

During his pontificate he took over 40 foreign trips; issued four encyclicals and seven exhortations; canonized 942 saints (including St. Junipero Serra on 9/23/15 in his only visit to the U.S.); changed Church policy and the Catechism on the death penalty; spoke out for migrants, the poor, and the marginalized; and he appointed over half of the current College of 135 Cardinals who will elect his successor.

He was called "a man of profound faith, peace and humility."

May his soul rest in peace. We also pray for the College of Cardinals who will choose his successor in the coming weeks.

#### MATT WHISMAN, DEPUTY CORONER, SPOKE TO OUR CLUB ON APRIL 7

Matthew Whisman, the Indigent Burial Coordi**nator for Catholic Charities**, as well as the Deputy Coroner for Jefferson

County, spoke at our April 7 meeting.

Matt graduated from St. Xavier High School in 2012 and then went on to U of K and got his bachelor's in history and international studies. After leaving there he attended U of L and received his master's in public administration. Then he went to Eastern Washington University where he received a master's in education. He also



went to the University of North Alabama for his master's in criminal justice; and he's currently working through New Mexico State for his master's in public health. Matt is also a certified end-of-life doula, a thanatologist (a specialist in death, dying, bereavement and grief), and has certifications as a funeral services associate, a non-profit leader, and a grief counselor.

Matt has been with the St. Joseph of Arimathea Society since his time at St. X, first volunteering in 2011 and staying active after he graduated by raising money for the headstone program, Be A Memory *Maker*. In 2020, he was asked to join Catholic Charities of Louisville as the Indigent Burial Coordinator serving full-time until he took a job as a Deputy Coroner for Jefferson County. He currently serves in both roles until the new Indigent Burial Coordinator takes over at Catholic Charities.

When Matt is not working, he enjoys hiking, traveling, and going to concerts.

The Indigent Burial Program in Louisville has made national headlines for schools like St. X, Trinity, Mercy and Sacred Heart volunteering to bury the indigent. The indigent are people who died with no funds for burial, and no family who could afford it or were interested in bearing the cost.

The program was started in the 1980s by local government and was run by the Coroner's Office until 2021, when it was taken over by Catholic Charities, although the county provides the grave plots. The students have been leading the prayer and graveside services since 2006 through the St. Joseph of Arimathea Society.

With the support of Metro Council, the Coroner's Office, and Metro Parks (which maintains the public cemeteries), Catholic Charities of Louisville got involved with this program in 2020. Louisville Metro has been supporting the program with tax dollars. Meadowview Cemetery filled up this year, with Archbishop Shelton Fabre assisting at the last indigent burial there. The indigents are being buried mostly in River Valley Cemetery now. Other sights are also being used, especially for indigent veterans.

"Louisville prides itself on being a compassionate city," Matt said.

The Indigent Burial Program is currently looking for other sights for burials. The program is searching for a plot of land, maybe 25 or more acres, where they could continue this for many years, since the indigent burial sights of all the other cemeteries are almost filled. Due to tree roots, rocks, and other problems, not all land is appropriate. Matt applauds Metro Council for being proactive on these issues.

The program has nothing to do with maintaining the sights. That job falls to Metro Parks.

While a normal burial can cost \$9,000 to \$10,000, this program attempts to keep the costs to a minimum, with tax dollars usually under \$1,000 per burial.

To qualify for the Indigent Burial Program, the deceased must have had limited assets at death and must have lived and died in Jefferson County (since local tax dollars are being used). They bury people of any religion. Matt says he's never buried a child.

Matt also spoke of how much the families really appreciate this program, even years after the burial.

They bury about 80 to 85 people per year. In some cases, there may be one or two dozen family members in attendance. But in most cases, the only people present are the volunteers.

Since court orders are required to put two people in one burial plot, that is rarely done; so, each person gets a separate plot.

The high school volunteers not only turn out to provide a dignified burial, but some also work to make concrete markers for about \$20 apiece.

When Metro Police find a deceased homeless per-

son, usually identification can be made. Matt knows of only one case in his experience where burial was made without identification, while identification came later.

Matt says most burials are for men; and they are mostly in the 50 to 75 age range. It's rare to have one under age 40. He says it's also rare to have people from another country since people of other nationalities take care of their own.

## SEMINARIAN HARRISON FREY SPOKE AT OUR APRIL 21 MEETING.

Harrison Frey, age 28 and one of our seminarians, is currently on a pastoral year, assigned to St. Athanasius parish. He's gaining pastoral experience and will return to a seminary in August to continue with his studies.

He's originally from the Eastern Shore of Maryland and grew up attending St. Francis de Sales parish in Salisbury. He studied psychology and Chinese at Stony Brook University on Long Island; he studied Pastoral Care at Fordham University; and most recently, Harrison studied philosophy and completed his first year

of theology at St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore.

He has two brothers, a fraternal twin brother and a younger brother. In his spare time, Harrison enjoys playing the piano, cooking, and reading. He has also enjoyed getting to know the city of Louisville over the past few months. He's "looking forward to spending time ministering here to the people of the Archdiocese of Louisville, as the Lord wills."

For a time in college, he fell out of regular practice of the faith. However, starting his senior year, there was a Chapter of FOCUS (the Fellowship of Catholic University Students); and this helped to get him back into his Catholic faith. One priest, who was very kind and frequently available to the students, helped Harrison in his return to the Church.

Also, Harrison attended the 2019 SEEK Conference in Indianapolis. There was also an opportunity to venerate the heart of St. John Vianney, which was traveling the U.S.

He began pursuing a master's degree in pastoral care at Fordham University, but later discerned he was not called to continue that path, but, instead, to discern the priesthood more intently in seminary.

He finally entered St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore for the Diocese of Wilmington, Delaware. It was there that he met Louisville seminarians Michael Schultz and Yen Tran, now both priests for the Archdiocese of Louisville. Eventually he met Fr. Martin Linebach, our Vicar for Vocations. Harrison felt a call to serve the people of the Louisville Archdiocese. He

joined our own seminarians in May of 2024.

Harrison has much gratitude for all the support he has received from people in Louisville. At this time, he has not yet been informed of the seminary he'll attend this fall. He has now completed one year of theology.

Working at St. Athanasius for the last year, he speaks of having been surprised at the 40+ different spiritual and outreach groups and activities in the parish.

When asked what surprised him about seminary life, Harrison spoke of the old quote, "Man plans, and God

laughs." He said that as a child he was the one of the three brothers who complained the most about going to Mass. And his brothers were surprised when Harrison spoke of becoming a priest and then surprised again when he decided to move to Louisville. However, everyone in his family appreciates good bourbon; so, they all accepted the change, he joked! He says his family is very supportive.

Harrison could be ordained in three years, including one year as a transitional deacon. He asks for our prayers.

We want to thank Harrison for his time and the update on his vocation journey.

#### OUR MONTHLY NATIONAL "SERRA MEETS" WAS HELD APRIL 21

The 52<sup>nd</sup> monthly "Serra Meets" by Zoom had **Rosie Chinea Shawver** as the guest speaker. She is the Executive Director of Catholic Campus Ministry As-

**sociation** (CCMA) and an energetic speaker. She has 20 years of experience in ministry.

Rosie is committed to empowering Catholic campus ministers and students across the country. She has served as the director of campus minister at the University of Southern California in L.A. as well as the University of New Mexico. She was the executive director of the Catholic Association for Latino Ministry. She has extensive experience working with the US / Mexico border in El Paso. Also, she worked with Catholic Charities in Santa Fe, which helped her incorporate faith with social justice ministry.

She holds a BS in psychology, with a major in healthcare, from the University of San Diego.

She got a master's in divinity from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley. And she has a certificate of not-for-profit management from Indiana University's Lilly Family School of Philanthropy. She



began her ministry at UC San Diego.

Rosie gave us some very interesting statistics. There are 6,000 college and university campuses in the U.S. Also, Pew Research shows that 79% of disaffiliated Catholics leave the Church by age 23 – during the college years. Thirty percent of U.S. adults now identify with no religion, with higher percentages among Millennials (born 1980 - 1995) and Gen Z (born 1996 - 2010).

Despite 3.1 million Catholic college students in the U.S., only one in four four-year institutions and one in 64 community colleges have a campus ministry presence.

Eighty-two percent of students engaged in Catholic campus ministry remain active in their faith post-graduation. There are 600+ CCMA ministers on 335+ campuses across the country. Students engaged in campus ministry are six times more likely to attend Mass regularly post-graduation. They are five times more likely to consider a religious vocation. They are eight times more likely to stay connected to parish life after college. Students who are active in their faith during college and attend Mass, give four times more than their non-church going counterparts after college.

Rosie also spoke of how several national organizations work together. The Newman Connection, (continued on page 6)

which is part of **Newman Ministry**, works to keep high school graduates in touch with their faith as they go off to college. The people they get in touch with are local campus ministers, including people trained by CCMA and young "missionaries" of the Fellowship of Catholic University Students (**FOCUS**). These missionaries are usually young people who have recently graduated and are devoting a couple of years of their lives to campus ministry just before they move on with their lives. The CCMA certified individuals are usually older and more experienced individuals who are making a career out of campus ministry.

Rosie also made some very good suggestions for "ways you can awaken the giant" of faith evangelization on college campuses. She spoke of getting to know your local campus ministry; welcoming college students at your parish; giving strategically – to groups like your local campus ministry, FOCUS, Newman Ministry, and CCMA; being a connector; talking to your local bishop; and praying intentional-

#### RECALLING EMBER DAYS, AND USING THEM TO PRAY FOR VOCATIONS

Fr. Patrick Dolan, the Chaplain of the St. Serra



Club of Louisville, wanted to share a message that is in the Catholic Answers Spring magazine about the Ember Days. They were three days of prayer, fasting, and abstinence (Wednesday, Friday, and Saturday) observed four times a year - when we thanked God for creation; and we can also offer prayers for vocations on these

days.

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Fr. Pat suggests that we voluntarily participate in those days (still part of the church calendar but hidden since Vatican II's reforms) for vocations

(particularly here in the US). The days fall in the first week of Lent (almost a review of Ash Wednesday), the week after Pentecost, the days following the Exaltation of the Holy Cross (Sep. 14th) and the feast of St. Lucy (Dec. 13th).

Rather than extreme abstinence, Fr. Pat recommends the partial abstinence of the ordinary days of Lent (except the Friday of the first week of Lent) with fasting (essentially no eating between our small meals) and meat at only one meal - but a special prayer for vocations (perhaps our two Serran prayers). This would keep the need for priests a bit more alive by recapturing a courageous ancient Catholic tradition. We could certainly do it at the individual level and the club level. But he suggests we pass the word on to encourage that it be done on the national and international level.

## FRIENDS OF SERRA - Affiliates of the Saint Serra Club of Louisville PROMOTING VOCATIONS THROUGH PRAYER AND FINANCIAL SUPPORT

#### WHAT IS THE SAINT SERRA CLUB? WHAT DO WE DO?

We are an international lay group of men and women, who do what we can to support all people who have chosen a religious vocation. We also promote future vocations, and try to develop the faith formation of our Members.

We usually meet twice a month (first and third Mondays for lunch, usually at the same location each month), with speakers at almost all our meetings.

In addition to prayers for vocations, we have organized annual luncheons for women religious; sponsored send-off luncheons for our seminarians in August of each year; sponsored the Men's and Women's Archdiocesan Conferences: Coordinated with the Vocation Office for the Vocation Poster and Essay Contests (providing certificates and cash prizes); promoted the Newman Connection, which keeps college students in touch with the Church through campus ministry or nearby parishes; sponsored the pictorial seminarian prayer card for the Archdiocese; sent birthday cards to our seminarians; promoted the Traveling Chalice Program and the Traveling Crucifix Program in schools and parishes; given boxes of candies to 500 sisters for Christmas: promoted the 31-Club of parishioners each picking a day of the month to pray for vocations; promoted Adopt-A-Seminarian and Adopt-A-Priest programs; promote Priest Appreciation Day and Deacon Appreciation Day; and much more.

About \$4,000 of our budget is spent on these items. Member dues (\$110 every six months) help cover the cost of the many things we do. Also, about 42% of our Member dues help support Serra International and the USA Council of Serra International.

#### WHO ARE FRIENDS OF SERRA?

Some Serra Clubs have "Friends of Serra" for people who are unable to become full Members due to time constraints or the physical constraints of getting out of their homes.

The Saint Serra Club of Louisville has decided to start a Friends of Serra program, asking for donations of at least \$50 per year. (That's less than \$5 per month.)

Our club could do so much more if we had additional financial support. This would include increasing prizes for vocation poster and essay contests, doing more for Clergy Appreciation Day, senior women religious, seminarians, etc.
