

POPE LEO XIV - ROBERT FRANCIS PREVOST - 267TH SUCCESSOR TO ST. PETER

Our new pope was born Sep 14, 1955, and raised in Chicago. He graduated from Villanova University in



PA, an Augustinian school, where he received a bachelor's in mathematics. He received his diploma in theology at Catholic Theological Union of Chicago; and he went to the **Pontifical Saint Thomas Aquinas University** (Angelicum) in Rome, where he received his doctorate in Canon law

Robert Prevost was ordained an Augustinian priest 6/19/82 and has the

O.S.A. designation (Order of St. Augustine). In addition to be a missionary to Peru, he was provincial over the Chicago province of Augustinians. He eventually was made head over all Augustinians worldwide.

Fr. Prevost was appointed a bishop in Peru in 2014 and became a Peruvian citizen in 2015. So, he is a dual US/Peru citizen. Bishop Prevost was appointed a Cardinal by Pope Francis in 2023.

Cardinal Prevost ran the Vatican office that selects and manages bishops around the world.

He was elected the first U.S. Pope on May 8, 2025, at age 69. And he was only the fifth pope to be elected in two days.

Choosing the name Leo XIV is a nod to Pope Leo XIII (who died in 1903), who was known for promoting social justice, fair wages, rights of workers, and safe working conditions; he opposed socialism and unrestricted capitalism; he wrote **Rerum Novarum**;

and was known as the "Rosary Pope."

Pope Leo XIV speaks Italian, Spanish, French, Portuguese, and English. He is a "humble, intelligent and very pastoral person," according to Louisville's Archbishop Emeritus Joseph Kurtz, who has worked with Bishop Prevost.

He will continue using the motto he had as a bishop – "Although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one."

DR. DEKARLOS BLACKMON SPOKE AT OUR MAY 5 MEETING.

Our Speaker

F. DeKarlos Blackmon, Ed.D. is the Vice Chancellor for Pastoral Services of the Archdiocese of

Louisville. Having completed graduate studies in pastoral ministry, business, and education, Dr. Blackmon has previously served as the Supreme Knight, chief executive officer, and chairman of the board of the Knights of Peter Claver, and deputy president and president of the International Alliance of Catholic Knights. Among his



many ecclesial endeavors, he has also served as a consultant to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops Subcommittee on African American Affairs during the drafting of "Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love," the 2018 pastoral letter against racism. Dr. Blackmon is married to Dame Commander Kanobia A. Russell-Blackmon of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre of Jerusalem, who also serves as the chief communications officer for the Archdiocese of Louisville.

His Message

Dr. Blackmon began his message by explaining that Pope Francis suggested that young people should not be afraid of what God might ask of them for the reason that God calls each of us to make definitive choices as he has a plan for each of us. Blackmon explained that in response to this plan, to move toward personal fulfillment, each of us must "discover that plan and respond to our respective vocations," because it is in the Lord that we find profound joy.

Blackmon reminded his audience that they "have more opportunities than they think to encourage youth and young adults not only to ask the Lord for help but also to assure them that God will show them the way." While it is easy sometimes to fall into the temptation of doing what others would want one to do, especially when secularism competes with our holiness, it is important to often reflect on the role of the family in which the seeds of vocations must be planted.

In On Catechesis In Our Time, Pope Saint John Paul II emphasized the unique and vital role of the family in catechesis, urging parents to begin faith education during the earliest stages of their children's lives. Blackmon highlighted that the family should serve as the primary school of love, mercy, and forgiveness. Asserting that it is our collective responsibility to nurture vocations among the youth, allowing the Holy Spirit to guide their paths thereafter, Blackmon emphasized to the lunch participants that young people hear more of what they see than what we say. He explained, "We've always got to be about the business of modeling our values. We must move forward, in every way, what it means to be about the dignity and respect of each human person, even the ones that drive you to distraction."

Blackmon further articulated, "There is an overwhelming need in our world to be reoriented to the Lord. We need that right now more than anything. But to be able to receive the Sacraments, we need priests." Explaining that this task is not merely reserved to the archbishop or vocation director, he said that the responsibility of fostering vocations rightly belongs to each of us by virtue of our Baptism.

When speaking of himself and his own pastoral perspective, Blackmon simply conveyed, "If anybody asks you who I am, "Tell 'em, I'm a child of God." Quoting the popular phrase of Archbishop Shelton Fabre of Louisville "to err on the side of mercy," Blackmon asked whether we really presume the good, whether we are helping others, focused on truth, and turning over real leadership roles to young people in our parishes. He pressed the point that the Christian faithful must evangelize and do what is right, just, noble, and holy every day.

Speaking of his role as Vice Chancellor of Pastoral Services, he explained how he oversees various archdiocesan pastoral agencies like Faith Formation, Youth and Young Adults, Family and Life, Worship, Multicultural Ministry, Hispanic Ministry, Campus Ministry, and Diaconal Ministry. Blackmon emphasized how our pastoral agencies do not create programs to roll out to parishes and schools, but rather are endeavoring to foster relationships with pastors and parishes to serve the People of God.

In response to a question about where the archdiocese is going, Blackmon said that it's hard to say exactly where we will be in a couple of years. However, he explained that if we are to "err on the side of mercy in presuming the good about all the people around us, and endeavor to be more synodal, ... to be on pilgrimage with one another, and to truly be companions on the journey, I think we can realize a lot." Speaking of vocations, Blackmon commended Father Martin Linebach on having done a lot when one accounts for the number of seminarians we now have.

In closing, Blackmon mentioned that "this local church is going to reach new heights if we're all committed and oriented towards what the Lord wants us to do, by virtue of our Baptism. If we're walking together, looking for what the Lord wants of us, we cannot fail!" Blackmon simply ended by saying that if anyone asked what he's about in his new roles within the archdiocese, there are three things – "Dr. Blackmon is about the evangelization of peoples, the salvation of souls, and not merely rolling out programs to parishes and schools because we don't want to just throw things on the wall to see what sticks."

we expect to get at least five new seminarians this fall. And, for the first time in a long time, we expect to have four men in

college seminary, two from U of L. He also said that Deacon Cole McDowell will be ordained to the priesthood on May 31. Although we only ordain one new priest this year, the archbishop says the number entering the seminary will far outweigh the priests retiring or leaving the archdiocese.

A "culture of vocations" is what Archbishop Shelton says he really wants to create; and he knows that this is something Serra clubs promote. He says getting more seminarians is not about numbers. However, if young men see our posters showing a lot of seminarians, then the idea is not so foreign to them. He feels that young men can say to themselves, "If all of these guys are

thinking about it, maybe I can, too." These posters nurture a culture of vocations.

Fr. Martin Linebach, our Vocation Director, stays in touch with many young men discerning a vocation. The archbishop thinks that all our new seminarians this fall have been working with Fr. Martin for at least a year.

The archbishop also spoke of the "Pope Leo effect" — that the new pope might have an impact on the growth of the Church as well as the number of young men considering a vocation.

He also mentioned that Fr. Kien Nguyen has decided to move back to Vietnam. Our policy has always been that when we educate Vietnamese seminarians, then after five years of priesthood in service to our archdiocese, they can choose to return home.

Archbishop Shelton also spoke of the federal regulations that are still being discussed in Washington,

SOME OF THE 70-YEAR HISTORY OF OUR CLUB

The Serra Organization was formed by some Catholic businessmen in the state of Washington to fill a void in the Catholic Church. This was in 1934 when recruiting people to enter religious life was mostly left to individual priests and religious. Serra was born in 1935 to help the Church promote vocations. Serrans always think of themselves as 'planting seeds.'



May 22 of 1955, the Louisville chapter was chartered by **Louis Aaru**, **Emmett Ratterman** and **Tom Ransdell** (all now deceased).

The Louisville Club provided many national and international leaders. Louis Aaru was the International President at one time. Emmett Ratterman and Tom Ransdell were on the advisory board for The Serra International Foundation (the fundraising arm of Serra); and **John Tichenor** (now deceased) was President of the USA Council. Serran **Ken Peet** has spent the last few years as a Regional Director and sat on the USA Council Board of Trustees.

The Louisville club initiated "Dinner with the Archbishop" - which was an annual pizza party for all the high school young men and women to learn about various vocations. They usually had about 200 to 300 youth in attendance.

The Louisville chapter once hosted the international convention held at the Kentucky Fairgrounds. The club also maintains contact with our archdiocesan seminarians on a regular basis (through our Adopt-A-Seminarian program) and sends ordination anniversary cards to all our priests.

The club once had silhouettes made of a priest and a nun. The kids would put their heads in the opening; and Serrans would take Polaroid pictures to give them.

Junipero Serra, chosen to be the Serra International's patron, was a Spanish Franciscan missionary who gave up teaching in Spain to come to Mexico and the U.S. in the 18th century and convert native Mexican and American souls to the Catholic faith. Along with Spanish soldiers and other Franciscans, he founded missions on the western coast of California – missions that turned into some of today's California cities. Rules written by Serra on behalf of native Americans became part of the laws in California; and many schools and roads were named after Serra.

Today, the club works with the Vocation Office on such projects as the Vocation Poster and Essay Contests and starting Parish Vocation Ministries. The club also promotes "31 Clubs" of people praying for vocations and for the Vocation Office; the Traveling Chalice and Traveling Crucifix programs; Altar Server Awards; Priesthood Sunday; Deacon Sunday; National Sisters Week; World Day for Consecrated Life; National Vocation Awareness Week; and much more.

When Pope Francis came to the U.S. in 2015, he canonized Junipero Serra. Afterwards, the Louisville club of lay men and women added 'Saint' to its name. The club's chaplain is **Fr. Pat Dolan** (of St. Stephen Martyr Parish), while its assistant chaplain is **Fr. Jeff Hopper** (of St. Christopher Parish).

"SERRA MEETS" WAS ON MAY 19, 2025

The 53rd monthly "Serra Meets" was held by Zoom, with **Fr. John "Jack" Wall, President of Catholic Extension**

Society, as the speaker. He spoke on "Supporting Priestly Vocations in Mission Dioceses."

Ordained in 1968 and now in his 80s, Fr. Jack was pastor of the old St. Pat's Parish in Chicago, the second oldest parish in that city. He also served in the vocations office of the Archdiocese of Chicago and



was once the chaplain for a Serra Club.

The United States was once considered a mission country. But this ended in the early 1900s.

In many cities, dioceses could build cathedrals, parishes, hospitals and more. Yet, in poor rural areas, parishes were closing due to a lack of parish resources. The Catholic Extension Society (CES) was created in 1905 through the efforts of Fr. Francis Kelly. It had the first lay board of any Catholic organization in the country. Then it became affiliated with the Vatican.

It is a national, non-profit, fundraising organization that supports and strengthens poor mission dioceses across the United States. Currently, 86 of the 196 dioceses in the U.S. qualify for assistance from the CES.

The CES President is appointed by the Vatican and Fr. Jack was appointed to this position in March of 2007. He is now in his fourth five-year presidency.

Their mission is to work in solidarity with people to build up vibrant and transformative Catholic faith communities among the poor in the poorest regions of the U.S. They do this in three ways: (1) constructing church buildings (14,000 over the years); (2) promoting and supporting young people who will be future leaders of the Church, including priests as a primary focus; and (3) support diocesan ministries themselves.

They now support 400 to 500 young men studying for the priesthood.

Fr. Jack reminded us that "faith says we are more than our circumstances." He spoke of millions of people in this country who are aspirational about their children. He gave many success stories for the CES. For example, the Diocese of Little Rock, where only 15% of the population is Catholic, is served by CES; and yet they ordained 50 priests in the last 15 years! One young man was from a poor family in South Carolina and was helped by the CES; this young many eventually became Cardinal Joseph Bernardin.

Few of the poor communities served by CES have colleges or seminaries. So, they must be sent to seminaries in other dioceses. (In Kentucky, the Owensboro and Lexington dioceses are served by CES.)

CES receives no government support and get their funds from donors around the country. They do direct mailing and once sold the "Extension Magazine" to 800,000 people. It's now a quarterly magazine sent to anyone giving \$25 or more per year to the CES.

He also spoke of how many religious women are the evangelical leaders in the poor communities they serve.
