The pastoral ministry agencies of the Archdiocese of Louisville have the noble objective to support and educate all Catholics in ministry, leadership, and service. This work, effected through our many programs and activities and support of pastors and parishes, responds with Gospel values to the needs not only of the particular church of Louisville but also of the universal Church and society in general.

Deacons play a key role in advancing and maintaining the apostolic mission of the Church, particularly through the essential ministry of charity and justice which is characterized by initiatives focused on social issues and the promotion of integral human development. Serving as a reminder of the mission to embody service and promote justice in the world, through the deacon's own example of dedicated service and commitment to advocacy, he inspires the Christian faithful to reflect the spirit of Christ's service in our lives.

The lay faithful should never lose sight of our role as members of the common priesthood of the faithful. We possess an indispensable role in the mission of the Church (cf. *Apostolicam Actuositatem*, 1). Pope Benedict XVI stated that above all, the *Decree on the Apostolate of the Laity [Apostolicam Actuositatem]*, "stresses that 'the success of the lay apostolate depends upon the laity's living union with Christ,' that is, a solid spirituality, nourished by active participation in the liturgy and expressed in the style of the evangelical beatitudes" (Angelus Address, November 13, 2005).

Whether our days begin at the Pastoral Center, Maloney Center, Catholic Charities, one of our parishes, or a prison unit, we are reminded that Christ was sent into the world to bring glad tidings to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives, to give sight to the blind, and to free the oppressed (Luke 4:18). In Christ, through baptism, we are born again and made a royal priesthood, a holy people set apart. Even more, your diaconal ministry furthers the efforts of the Christian faithful to carry the Gospel message into the world. Our work is integral to the apostolate of the laity derived from our Christian vocation.
