From the Diaconal Director

Dear Friends, My Dear Companions on the Journey,

Do you resolve to prepare yourselves in mind and spirit to give faithful service to Christ the Lord and His Body the Church? — Rite of Candidacy



There is no doubt that there are many good men committed to the Church. As I live fully my baptismal call, I would like to think that I am one of such men. However, diaconal ministry takes more than being merely committed to the Church by measure of the superficial activities of community life. When contemplating the Church's ministry of the Word, ministry of liturgy, and ministry of charitable service and justice through the promptings of the Holy Spirit, the superficial activities of community life are insufficient to shore up the weight of the faithful service demanded to and for Christ the Lord and his Body, the Church. You, my dear brothers, are being asked to do a lot more!

I have been incredibly blessed to participate in Sunday Eucharist with varying parochial communities around our archdiocese. This participation in Mass with varying communities has been incredibly important — and life-giving — for me. These opportunities have served in a very special way to express how the work of discernment is not bound within a formation program of activities envisioned to promise results. Rather, the homilies during these liturgies, coupled with the participation in the Eucharist, praying with, encountering, and accompanying God's people in their respective communities, have drawn me into closer communion with the Lord.

As Sacred Scripture reminds us that God would encounter his people in the desert, similarly Jesus would go off into the desert to pray. Just as Jesus prayed that he not only might see more clearly the will of the Father but also embrace the will of the Father, let us also come to use these opportunities to encounter the Father in the desert. As sitting with the Lord through adoration of Christ in the tabernacle is a customary manner of adoration, we are provided a tangible opportunity to remember that Jesus too was a pilgrim.

In the flurry of activities that imbue our ecclesial ministry, coupled with the occasional frustrations of contending with difficult people, adoration *in the desert* provides opportunities not only to recharge, refresh, and energize, but also to allow the Lord to bring us back to him so that we may see more clearly his will for us. Let's approach this Advent encouraged to sit before the Blessed Sacrament, even without exposition.

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

CELEBRATING MARY OUR MOTHER MARY Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe

A rchbishop Shelton will celebrate Mass of Our Lady of Guadalupe for people to seek with ever more lively faith the progress of peoples in the ways of justice and of peace.

The Church in the United States observes the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe, the patroness of the Americas. Archbishop Shelton J. Fabre will preside over a concelebrated Votive Mass for the Feast of Our Lady of Guadalupe on Saturday, December 6, at 10 a.m. at Our Lady of Lourdes Church in Louisville. Father David Sanchez will preach. Catholics throughout Central Kentucky are invited to come together to commemorate and reflect on the miraculous apparitions to Saint Juan Diego at Tepeyac in Mexico in 1531.

Our Lady of Guadalupe, recognized as the titular of Mary, Star of the New Evangelization, holds a significant role as the patroness of the Americas and the unborn, having appeared as a pregnant mother. She serves as a unifying figure, bridging diverse cultural families and communities within the Church. Our Lady serves as a profound reminder of the call to unity in Jesus Christ. In times when so many of our brothers and sisters face fear and anxiety, we are called to reflect on the enduring words of Our Lady to Saint Juan Diego, which offer comfort and reassurance: "Do not fear any illness or vexation, anxiety or pain. Am I not here, I who am your Mother? Are you not under my shadow and protection?"

All deacons with faculties are invited to vest in an alb, and the archdiocesan issued stole and dalmatic for the liturgy. Deacons should RSVP to Madeline Kincaid, mkincaid@archlou.org, at once to ensure appropriate seating by the Office of Worship.


Stational Masses of the Diocesan Bishop

Deacons emphasize the diaconal nature of the Church between the Celebration of the Eucharist and the mission of the Church to serve our communities.

Currently, deacons are invited and expected to participate in the Stational Masses of the Diocesan Bishop. These liturgies include the Chrism Mass, diaconal ordinations, presbyteral ordinations, and other major archdiocesan liturgies. As previously stated to the community, "in the person of Archbishop Shelton, the presence of Jesus Christ, the Eternal High Priest, is manifested among the Christian faithful."

These specific liturgies are important in the life of our local church as Archbishop Shelton proclaims the Word of God to all nations and continuously administers the sacraments of faith to the believers (*Lumen Gentium*, 21). This exercise of the fullness of the priesthood is especially realized in the Eucharist, which he offers (*Lumen Gentium*, 26), as the Church derives its very life from the Eucharist (*Ecclesia de Eucharistia*, 1), regarded as "the source and summit of the Christian life" (*Lumen Gentium*, 11; *Catechism*, 1324; *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, 10).

As these liturgies are regarded as a symbol of unity within the Church – featuring a comprehensive ceremonial structure and the full array of ministers including not only concelebrating priests with the archbishop, but also deacons, acolytes, and lectors, together with the full and active participation of the lay faithful – the presence and participation of our deacons is imperative (cf. *Caeremoniale Episcoporum*, 119-121). Please know that the Chrism Mass and the two ordinations are scheduled at the Cathedral of the Assumption. Deacons who are not assisting in the sanctuary will assume the postures of the assembly.



ary and Juan Diego are models of humble diakonia — service that bridges divine mystery and human need, liturgy and social action.

The appearance of Our Lady of Guadalupe in 1531 stands as a significant example for Catholic social teaching and diaconal ministry, highlighting key principles such as human dignity, culturally relevant evangelization, preferential care for the marginalized, and solidarity in the pursuit of justice. By choosing to reveal herself to Saint Juan Diego, a humble indigenous man, Mary exemplified a faith-driven approach to social change that addresses cultural contexts and the needs of the vulnerable.

The connections between diaconal ministry and the miraculous appearances of Saint Juan Diego at Tepeyac in Mexico in 1531 encompass several key elements: the proclamation of Mary's message in Nahuatl (proclamation of the word), the tilma's Eucharistic imagery portraying Mary as pregnant, symbolizing the presence of Jesus Christ, the "Bread of Life" (celebration of liturgy), and the commitment to charitable outreach aimed at protecting the marginalized and oppressed (practice of charity).

As we meditate on Our Lady of Guadalupe, we are able to see how Mary and Juan Diego are portrayed as models of humble diakonia - service that bridges divine mystery and human need, liturgy and social action. In like manner, the deacon, ordained "not for the priesthood but for the ministry" (Lumen Gentium, 29), embodies Christ's servant heart, particularly in the diakonia of charity, where he witnesses and ministers to the poor as an extension of the Eucharist. Deacons embody the connection between the Gospel and a life characterized by love across various social and ecclesiastical settings.

The appearance of Our Lady to Saint Juan Diego exemplifies her role as the "handmaid of the Lord" (Luke 1:46). Through her humble service, she presents Saint Juan Diego with roses, symbolizing faith and trust. This action parallels the charge and task of the deacon, who is called to seek out those in need and to embody the compassion of the Good Samaritan (cf. Luke 10:25-37).

When speaking to permanent deacons and their wives during his Apostolic Journey to the United States and Canada in Detroit in 1987, Pope Saint John Paul II reminded deacons that the ministry of charity obliges deacons to serve as a transformative influence within society, acting as catalysts for renewal through Jesus Christ, ultimately fostering a community that reflects the family of God. The pope was echoing the words of the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council by conveying that the Church "serves as a leaven" and the spiritual essence of human society, aiming to be renewed in Christ and transformed into a community that reflects the family of God (cf. Gaudium et Spes, 40).

May the annual celebration of Our Lady of Guadalupe present a valuable opportunity to entrust the threefold responsibilities of diaconal ministry - the proclamation of the word, the celebration of liturgy, and the practice of charity - to Mary, the Mother of Jesus. Let us ask Our Lady of Guadalupe to continue to enrich diaconal ministry through our focus on humble service, charity, and the connection between the Church and the broader world - reflecting the role of the deacon as an exemplar of Christ the Servant.

DEACON COUNCIL



The Diaconal Advisory Council, a consultative body representing the diaconal community, provides advice and counsel to the Archbishop and the Director of Diaconal Ministry.

Archbishop Shelton has made some recent appointments to the Council on the Permanent Diaconate (Diaconal Advisory Council). With the expiration of the terms of Deacon Stephen Heil and Regina Ryan, the archbishop has appointed Deacon Dean Giulitto to serve as the representative for Deanery 6 and Jennifer Bush as the representive for the wives, effectively replacing Deacon Heil and Mrs. Ryan on the Council. Deacon Richard Fagan is being reappointed to represent Deanery 7.

Members of the Council are Deacon Jim Shields (Deanery 1), Deacon Lucio Caruso (Deanery 2), Deacon Mark Kelley (Deanery 3), Deacon Kenneth Roberts (Deanery 4), Deacon Dean Sears (Deanery 5), Deacon Dean Giulitto (Deanery 6), Deacon Rick Fagan (Deanery 7), Deacon Bruce Sullivan (Deanery 8), Jennifer Bush (Wives), Donrita Webb (Wives), Deacon Dennis Nash, Deacon Mark Preischel, Dr. DeKarlos Blackmon, and Madeline Kincaid.

The Council met at Flaget Retreat Center on November 15 and elected officers for 2026. Deacon Kelley was elected the chairperson, Deacon Shields was elected the vice chairperson, and Madeline Kincaid continues to serve the Council as secretary.


